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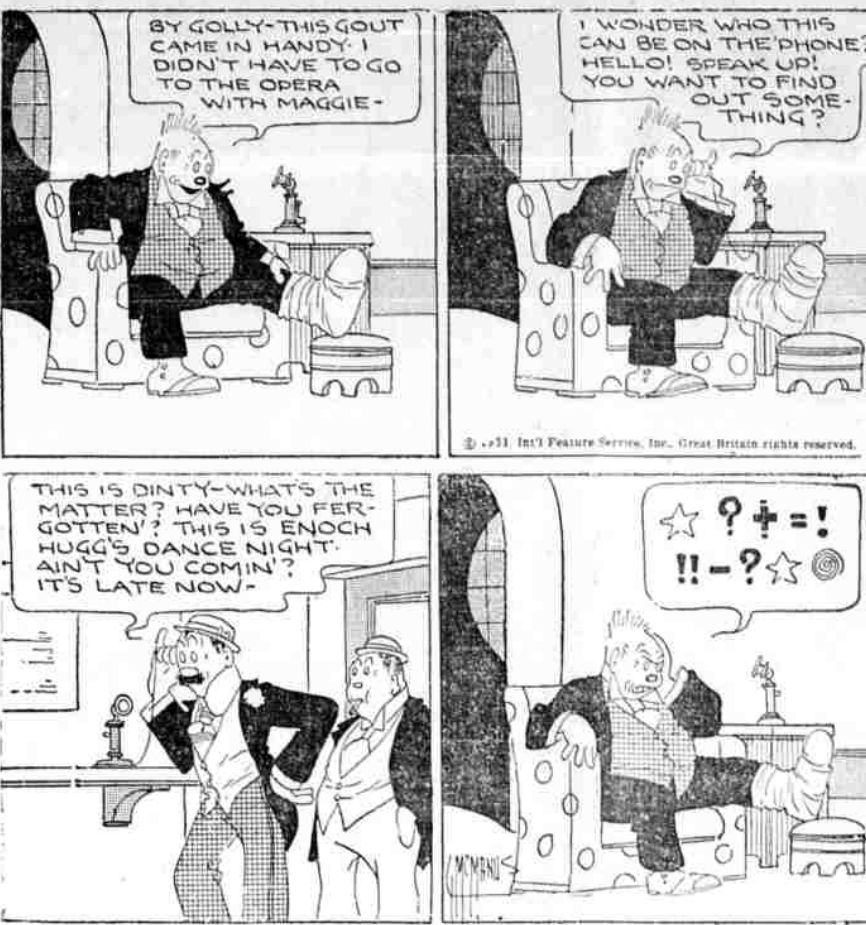

## JUDICIAL COUNCIL TO SEEK CHANGES IN OREGON CODE

Publicity Ban in Cases of Disbarment and Service Prior to Complaints Recommended.

PORTLAND, Jan. 2.—Legislation designed to avoid publicity in disbarment complaints against attorneys and jurists until investigation has been completed, has been developed by the committee on the judiciary, and will be presented to the legislature at its session in March. The committee also recommended that a ban be placed on the publication of any news of disbarment proceedings until the attorney has been found guilty of misconduct.

Chief Justice Oliver P. Cushman, presiding, appointed a committee consisting of Judges Walter H. Evans, L. P. Hewitt, W. A. Alkwall, and Hall S. Lusk of Portland, Judge W. M. Duncan, Lakeview, and Albert B. Ridgway, Portland, who served temporarily as secretary.

**Another Change Sought**  
Another action designed to avoid what the jurists considered premature publicity was the appointment of a committee to prepare an act to permit institution of legal action without first filing a complaint. This legislation is along the lines of a Washington law, and will allow the serving of papers on a defendant without complaint being first filed, and enable a settlement to be effected without any public notice of the proceedings having been instituted.

A general legislative committee was also appointed to not before the state legislature such bills as the assembly approves. Named on this committee were Justice Harry Bell and Judges Robert Tucker, Portland, and James T. Brand, of Marshfield.

The equalization of premarital challenges of jurors in criminal cases was made a special order of business for the afternoon session. Members of the Oregon judicial council are Chief Justice Cushman, Justice Bell, and Judges Tucker, Brand and Brand.

## ENTIRE BUSINESS BLOCK IS BURNED

## SENATOR BENNETT SEEKS PHONE QUIZ

PORTLAND, Jan. 2.—A committee of nine, invested with all the present powers of the public service commission, to investigate telephone rates with a view of effecting a reduction, is provided in the senate joint resolution to be introduced at the legislature by Senator J. E. Bennett of Multnomah county.

The committee, Bennett said today, will consist of three senators appointed by the president of the senate, three representatives appointed by the speaker of the house, and three persons appointed by the governor. The committee will have the power to subpoena witnesses and investigate the books of the telephone company. It will be authorized to expend not to exceed \$1,000.
