

CONCENTRATION OF POWER SCORED BY GOV. ROOSEVELT

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 1.—A warning against concentration of power in government and a plea for reform in local government now "archaic in design" predominated the second inaugural address of Franklin D. Roosevelt at his induction into office today.

The governor's comment on the too absolute concentration of power came with an illustration of an incident which he declared was representative of "the dangerous tendency to forget a fundamental American democracy which rests on the right of a locality to manage its local affairs—the tendency to encourage concentration of power at the top of a governmental structure alien to our system and more closely akin to a dictatorship or the central committee on a communist regime."

A letter from an editor which the governor said "tearfully" informed him that all local government had broken down prompted the governor to discuss the matter in his address. The editor begged the governor, the executive said, to "usurp and assume the functions of the officials duly elected by the communities" and said the alternative would be establishment of martial law.

The governor asked his audience to note in this plea the unconscious willingness to accept a tyrant or an absolute dictator in the governor's chair at Albany.

"Now, my friend was right about one thing," the governor said. "Local government as a whole is open to severe criticism and this applies to the cities, to the towns, to the counties and to the multiplicity of other local agencies."

"But why," he asked, "are our local governments archaic in design, unsuited for the purpose for which they are established, unsatisfactory in their functioning and profligate in the spend of the taxpayers' contributions? The answer is not hard to find. It is because the individual citizen is in different to his local problems." The governor declared it would be appalling to compute the millions of dollars which taxpayers have paid for the price of their indifference.

SUICIDES IN LEAP UNDERNEATH TRAIN

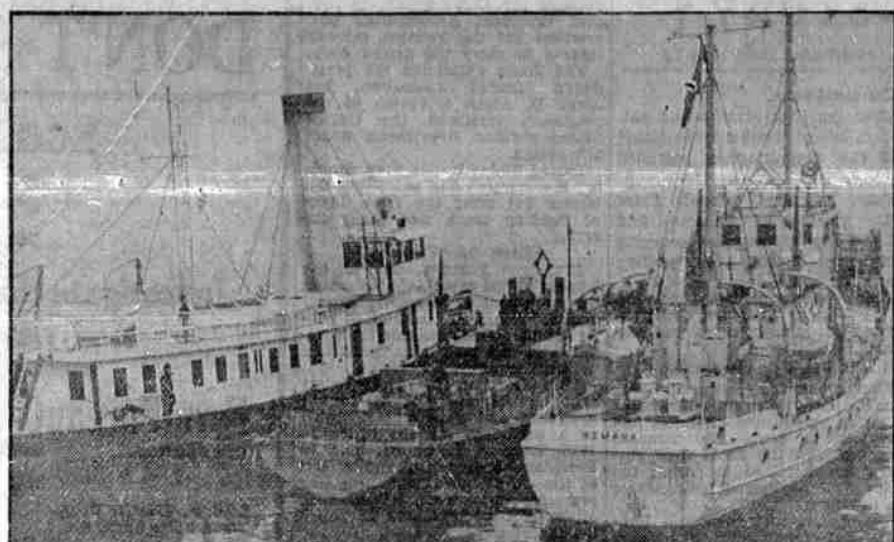

BUSINESS CHIEF FORESEES BIG YEAR

BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Jan. 2.—W. K. Kellogg, chairman of the board of the Kellogg company, food manufacturers, yesterday envisioned 1931 as "a period that will bring the most exceptional rewards to virtually all sound and aggressive lines of business."

"For some months past the country as a whole has been going through a period of readjustment," Kellogg said. "Business generally has been forced to appraise itself, on the basis of neither depression nor boom, but in its relation to normal times. The consumer also is ready to put his money back to work."

"We especially expect to increase our expenditures in newspaper advertising," Kellogg said.

ONE KILLED, TWO WOUNDED IN FEUD

BUCKEYE, Ariz., Jan. 12.—William Dyer, 26, is dead here today and two other homesteaders, one a woman, are wounded, victims of a Hassayampa river feud.

Enmity between Dyer and Nelson Kilgrew and his son Lewis, 19, had been smoldering for several weeks over the mysterious burning of a ranch house. This hatred was suddenly fanned to flame of shotgun fire as a herd of the Kilgrews' horses strayed across the Hassayampa river yesterday to graze on Dyer's home stead.

Dyer fired at the horses to drive them back and the Kilgrews opened fire on him with shotguns, sheriff's deputies said. William Mathewson, 23, who was in sympathy with Dyer, rushed to his friend's aid and was seriously wounded in one shoulder.

VETS HOME COST \$47.33 PER CAPITA

The per capita cost to the state of Oregon in maintaining residents in the Oregon State Soldiers' home was \$47.33 per capita, according to a report issued by the state board of control. Costs in other institutions range from \$15.81 for the Eastern Oregon hospital to \$65.12 for persons in Eastern Oregon Tuberculosis hospital. Other 1930 averages were: Oregon State hospital, \$17.61; penitentiary, \$22.53; feeble minded home, \$17.33; boys' training school, \$36; tuberculosis hospital, \$42.41; blind school, \$48.24; deaf school, \$43.89; girls' industrial home, \$34.32; blind employment institute, \$40.15.

The report shows a population of 5,651 in the 12 state institutions December 1, with the heaviest population at the state hospital with 2,015 patients. The Eastern Oregon hospital is second with 1,056. There are 143 boys and 78 girls in the industrial schools, and 391 tuberculosis patients in the two hospitals.

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ALABAMA DOWNS COUGARS, 24 TO 0

PASADENA, Cal., Jan. 2.—Southern football stood at a new high water mark today, swept there by Alabama's tidal wave which yesterday overwhelmed Washington state in a 24 to 0 defeat.

One large quarter, featured by three brilliant plays, and the crimson tide surged to new record of two victories and a tie in the last six years of the Rose tournament, fiesta's sixteen year old classic.

The triumph left the south in

complete command with three wins and no defeats, while in the previous ten years the east and middlewest managed to pull out only one victory apiece against Pacific coast opponents.

Alabama's tide broke loose in all its pentup fury in the second period and with a couple of long passes and a 41-yard run burst through the dike of the cougar defense with apparent ease for three touchdowns and the victory.
