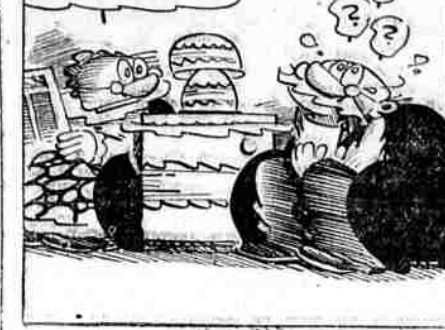

GASOLINE PRICES RECEIVE BOOSTS

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—The Standard Oil Co. of New Jersey, effective immediately, has advanced the price of U. S. motor gasoline in tank car lots to 7 cents a gallon, f. o. b. Atlantic seaboard. This is an advance of one-half cent at Bayonne, N. J., and one-fourth of a cent at Baltimore.

The Texas company has met this advance and also has met the advance of one-half cent of the Sinclair Consolidated Oil corporation throughout New England posted earlier in the week.

The Warner Quinlan Co. also has increased the price of U. S. motor gasoline in tank car lots to 7 cents, f. o. b. Bayonne, N. J.

The rise is the first important upturn in wholesale gasoline quotations since early last April.

The price situation has been one of the most unfavorable aspects of the petroleum industry and the increases by the big companies caused favorable comment in trade circles.

GRANTS PASS-YREKA HIGHWAY PROJECTED

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Jan. 3.—Construction of a new scenic highway between Grants Pass and Yreka, Calif., will be started by the Shasta-Yreka national forest service within 30 days, J. H. Billingslea, supervisor, announced today.

The road is to be twelve and a half miles long and will follow a mountain ridge at an approximate altitude of 4,500 feet.

A crew of workmen, all residents of Josephine county, already has been engaged.

The cost of the project has not been established definitely. Billingslea said.

FOUR RACE HORSES PERISH IN BLAZE

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 3.—Four thoroughbreds were burned to death today at the fair grounds race plant which opened for the new racing season on New Year's day. Property damage was estimated at \$25,000. The horses valued the horses burned at \$3,000 each.

MILK-SKIMMING DEMONSTRATION

Mr. C. L. Dahlman of Wharton Bros. put on a milk skimming demonstration at the Corvallis Creamery Co. station in this city Dec. 29th, using a McCormick-Deering separator. Whole milk was heated to 80 degrees F. H. and skimmed. A test of this skim milk was made and showed that this separator was skimming to one-hundredth of one percent (1/100 of 1%).

The temperature of another quantity of the whole milk was reduced to 40 degrees F. H. A test of this milk showed one-hundredth of one percent (1/100 of 1%).

Then a one-half dollar was placed in the bowl of the separator, throwing it out of balance, 40 degree milk was used and test of this milk showed one-hundredth of one percent (1/100 of 1%). This was strictly a stock machine. Mr. Herbert Kleeman made the skim milk tests.—Adv.

GAS CONCERN PLANS 31 MILLION BUDGET

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 2.—John E. Zimmerman, president of the United Gas Improvement company, said today he was so encouraged by the way U. G. I. properties stood the test of the greatest depression in many years, that construction budgets involving \$31,000,000 have been arranged for 1931 without reference to existing business conditions.

"So satisfied am I that prices have about reached bottom that we have carefully gone over our budget for 1931 with the object of advancing such projects as might be undertaken at once and so take advantage of the low price of materials," the statement continued.

Gradual and steady improvement in business is looked for by Mr. Zimmerman this year.

"I am confident," he added, "that the public utilities having given such a good account of themselves in 1930, will be among the first to feel the effect of such improvement in general conditions in increased sales of gas and electricity for industrial purposes."

WM. PARTIN, CIVIL WAR VET., PASSES

William Partin, 85, a resident of Harvard avenue, near the Oregon soldiers' home, died late last night after a long illness.

Mr. Partin was born in Lancaster, Iowa, October 26, 1845, and served during the Civil war with Company A, 36th Wisconsin Infantry. After his discharge, following a service of four years, he moved to Kansas, where he was married to Miss Sylvia England. They moved to Oklahoma Territory in 1889 and resided there until 1907, when they came to Roseburg and remained permanently.

He is survived by his widow and one son, W. E. Partin, and four grandchildren, Everett, Ruth, Veda and Donald Partin, all residents of Roseburg.

Funeral services will be held at the Roseburg Undertaking company Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. J. H. Penhall officiating. Interment will take place in the L. O. O. F. cemetery. E. Ritter is in charge of arrangements.
