CAPPER WHEAT DOLE PLAN IS OPPOSED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4 — An unfavorable report on the proposal of Senator Capper, republican, of Kansas, to have the farm board distribute for relief purposes 40,000,000 bushels of the surplus wheat it holds was made to the senate agriculture committee yesterday by the board.

Samuel McKelvie, wheat industry representative of the board, explained in a letter to Chairman McNary that the board was without authority to give away the wheat.

He said the board was anxious to cooperate for relief but that the members felt this should be done through the regular organized relief agencies.

"To give away the wheat," he wrote, "would impair the revolving fund of this board and use the money for purposes other than for which appropriated."

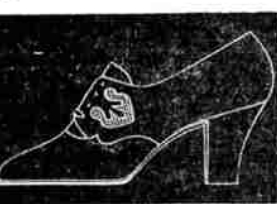
