

SEASON TICKET SALE STARTED BY SENIOR HOOPSTERS

The Roseburg senior high school basketball team is introducing a new feature this year, that of selling season tickets for all of the home games. Heretofore tickets have been sold for each game, but this year fans are to be offered season tickets, good for all of the seven scheduled games and any additional contests that may be arranged for the local gymnasium with the senior high team participating. The tickets are to be sold by the students for \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for students, giving a material reduction over the cost for individual games.

The local high school will play each of the five conference teams at the Roseburg gym and has also scheduled contests with Grants Pass and Eugene, making seven games in all for the season at Roseburg.

The opening contest is to be played Friday of this week against Myrtle Point.

Throwing Accuracy Sought
Coach Turner this year is making a very earnest endeavor to secure special accuracy on free throws. For many years he has been compiling records on scores of games, and these statistics show that if a team can convert one half of the free throws in the average game, it will win 90 per cent of its contests. This was proven in the alumni game recently won by the high school team. Both teams made seven field goals for a total of 14 points each. The alumni team converted one free throw and the high school 5, giving the school team a victory by a score of 19 to 15.

Players are being given extra coaching and practice in converting free throws. Every night each member of the squad is required to shoot 25 free throws. A special inducement the student body is offering a medal to the squad member, not necessarily a member of the first team, who converts the largest percentage of free throws in practice during the season. The contest starts tonight.

J. E. CLARK LOSES MOTHER BY DEATH

Mrs. Gertrude Clark, aged 76 years, mother of J. E. Clark, local Southern Pacific agent, died Sunday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Newton Bader, of Olympia, Wash., according to word received here today.

Mrs. Clark was born in Missouri and came with her husband and family to Oregon 35 years ago, locating at Creswell. The family later moved to Eugene. Since the death of Mr. Clark in 1921, she has made her home with her children. She was a member of the Baptist church, and was past worthy matron of the Order of Eastern Star at Creswell.

She leaves, besides her daughter, Mrs. Clara Bader of Olympia, and her son, James E. Clark of Roseburg, four grandchildren, Dorothy Senbrough of Olympia, Louis Senbrough of Los Angeles and Nedra and Eldred Clark of Roseburg.

Funeral services will be held at Creswell at 2 p. m. Tuesday with interment in the Creswell cemetery.

JOFFRE PRAISED BY PRESS OF GERMANY

BERLIN, Jan. 3.—Almost the entire German press today paid respectful tribute to Marshal Joffre as a dignified figure and simple bearded, patriotic Frenchman, who after his resignation in 1916, which he laid to political intrigue, harbored no rancor but continued to serve his country in all ways.

The victory of the Marne was due, in the opinion of the editors, more to the failure of the German command than to Joffre's strategic genius. One merit, however, none denies him—that he kept a cool head when all, for the time, seemed lost.

General Hermann von Kuhl, who was general von Kuhl's chief of staff and is a noted authority on the Marne battle, wrote today "In these circumstances Joffre showed a fortitude that marks the truly great." But continued "we Germans are nevertheless convinced that it was a calamitous chain of misunderstandings and personal failures that robbed us of victory."

The Berliner Tageblatt, revised gratefully that "never did Joffre utter an evil word against Germany or the German army, never did he thunder against the 'Boches' like Clemenceau nor pursue political aims like Poincaré."

The paper recalled grim old Alfred von Tirpitz' grudging tribute that Joffre was "a heart of oak."

EX-CONVICT CAUGHT WITH STOLEN AUTO

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 5.—David E. Smith, 33, Salem, Ore., was captured, gun in hand, near his wrecked car here after a holdup in Portland early today. He did not shoot at his pursuers. Police chased him from Portland and his machine believed to have been stolen, upset in the downtown district. An other gun was found in the car.

Smith, an ex-convict, will be turned over to Portland authorities.

\$200,000 ASKED FOR KLAMATH CANAL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—Senator Steiwer, republican, Oregon, introduced a bill today to appropriate \$200,000 for construction of a canal to divert the main canal of the Klamath project in the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon.

REHEARING DENIED IN W. O. W. ACTION

DENVER, Jan. 5.—The state supreme court today denied the application for a rehearing in the case of the Woodmen of the World, head quarters in Denver, and also denied the request for a modification of the decree, sought by camp officers of the organization.

The court only recently decided in favor of the state in the constitutionality of the organization, changing the term of insurance had not been legally adopted.

The Woodmen hold camp will meet in Denver soon to reconsider adoption of the amendment.

POWER FIRM PLANS LINE FROM GARDINER

EDMONTON, Ont., Jan. 3.—A New Year's bill of lavishing money was handed Phoenix Times-Sun by prominent firm that the West Coast Power company is to build extension from Gardiner to Phoenix and then to Mapleton, adding 20,000 h. p. to the plant. The money that will cost \$2,000,000 and the bill is \$200,000.

Then completion will allow this new power plant to generate all the power needed as far south as the coast.

MISHAP FAILS TO DETER
YOUNG BRITISH AVIATRIX
WARSAW, Jan. 5.—Despite a mishap sixty miles north of here, when she smashed the pre-war engine of her plane in making a forced landing late yesterday, Miss Amy Johnson, British woman aviator, was understood today to intend continuing her northward flight to Beijing, China.

Leaving Berlin shortly before noon, the 23-year-old girl was driven by the wind to the north of her objective, Warsaw, when she turned about she ran into a heavy fogbank and finally made a forced landing at the village of Anielin, near Krasnosiel, She was not injured.

Word reached here from Moscow that Russian air officials and aviators, convinced that they cannot deter her from her projected flight across Siberia and Mongolia, are mapping out the best route to her destination for her.

ern Pacific, as assistant yard master in East Portland, Oregon. Six months later, Brown transferred to the train service as a brakeman, following that work until 1906, when an accident at Oakland, Oregon, shattered one of his arms. Three years afterward he located on a ranch at Lents, about thirty miles from here, where he remained until 1914.

Geddes was employed for 15 years on the Chicago & Eastern Illinois railway system and at the time of his retirement was chief clerk to the general superintendent. During an interim of three years he operated a ranch near Fort Wayne, Indiana. He has also performed railroad work while a resident of Roseburg, acting as cashier at the Southern Pacific freight depot during American participation in the World war.

McClintock and Geddes located in Roseburg in 1912, the former coming here from Spokane on January 12, the latter arriving here from the east in April. They immediately became associated in the real estate business and four years afterward jointly purchased the Commercial Abstract company's establishment. Eventually Geddes withdrew from the firm to engage in other activities. Mr. McClintock is now the president of the concern. Both men have been prominent in civic and political affairs in Roseburg. McClintock has served seven years as a city councilman, two years as president of the chamber of commerce and one term as president of the Rotary club. He was born at Vernon, Missouri, in 1859. Geddes, too, has served on the city council, for one term, and also on the city school board for ten years. He was born in Illinois in 1878.

Unlike the other two men, Brown has never before served in an official position. Following his retirement from ranching at Lents he engaged in mining for a number of years here, from California and Nevada. He returned to Roseburg to reside in 1925. He was born in 1868 in what he terms the "Lynn Hollow" district, five miles west of Walker station, Lane county, Oregon. His parents were Oregon pioneers.

I. C. Thorson, driving down the street with his sister, stopped his car between two poles as they fell. One pole grazed his machine. The 57,000-volt line fell across the top of the car and grounded two feet in front of it. After waiting for wires to cease motion the Thorsons climbed out of their precarious position.

Abe Rosenbloom, Carl Porco and Charles Vicere were standing at a filling station when the nine poles blew down around them. They escaped injury.

Mrs. Aug Scruton of Westport was pinned under a temporary wooden wall, ten feet high, which collapsed under the wind in the downtown district. Pedestrians and police had difficulty in lifting the 25-foot section. Her left leg was injured.
