LOOKINGGLASS, Jan. 5.—Regardless of general depression of farm products, the people of this vicinity are facing the new year with confidence and hope.

The roads were never in better shape, and the schools are larger and better than ever before. The consolidation which was voted last summer has proved to be to the advantage of both the Plummer and Lookingglass valleys, and has enabled the directors to employ a fourth teacher. The bus service has been all that could be desired both from Rockaway and from Plummer.

The local grange seems to be taking on new life with new members and a new roof as evidence of prosperity. Further improvements are in prospect, and to help defray some of the expenses a picnic is scheduled for next Thursday evening. Other entertainments are also planned by the social committee.

Prospects also seem brighter for electric extension into the valley. It behooves the church to awake to the fact that she is facing the powers of darkness in a different way than ever before. Infidels like Voltaire, Payne and Ingersoll are no longer needed by the devil. The enemy is now on the inside; in many pulpits, in our educational institutions and editorial chairs.

The only infidelity worth noting these days is that inside of our churches, masquerading in ministerial garb, and we are told that we, with all our learning, literature, culture and aesthetics, have no further need of the old-fashioned revival.

The questionable amusement craze has invaded churches to such an extent that they bear a much closer resemblance to the living God. Their members are redeeming the world today, the saddest thing about poker games, and dancing, until they have neither time or strength for the service of the Lord.

As I study the situation in the world today, the saddest thing that confronts me is the fact that the average individual is satisfied just so long as he has a form of religion, yet he is without the fact of Godliness.

You may be sure that the spiritual life of the church is on a level with that in the home; it will never rise higher than your best homes, and never fall lower than your worst homes. The home was the first divine institution God ever planted on this earth and as goes the home, so goes the church.

If a man hasn't enough religion to pray in his home, he hasn't the God who takes him to heaven. Men, if you can live without prayer, you are as certainly on the road to hell as that you exist. Even Jesus Christ the Son of God could not live without prayer.

How shall the model church be supported? Not like most of them are supported today, God forbid. If you want to sink your church into pauperism, devoid of spiritual life and power, then feed it on oyster soup and ice cream, and clothe it with crazy-quits and old cast-off garments of the rummage sale.

I find the less piety a church has the more tin, oysters, and ice cream it takes to run it and the faster it runs from God toward the world and the devil. Say, men, if your religion isn't worth paying for then why not renounce the whole thing and go to hell like a gentleman.

A church that ceases to be a missionary church will soon be a missing church. The light that shines the farthest always shines the brightest at home. The church you find doing the most for foreign work you will find doing most for the home work.

EDICT TAKES TITLE FROM GERMAN PUG

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—The New York State Athletic commission today decided to withdraw heavyweight championship recognition from Max Schmeling, of Germany. The commission also announced it will consider a match between Jack Sharkey and an outstanding opponent, preferably Young Stribling, as for the heavyweight title.

The commission announced the indefinite suspensions of New York of Schmeling as well as his manager, Joe Jacobs.

The disbarment of the German, who was recognized as the world's champion by the commission after he won on a foul from Sharkey here in June, now may pave the way for a program climaxed by a title match between Schmeling and Stribling in Chicago, in June. A \$500,000 offer already has been received by Schmeling for this match and "Pa" Stribling has indicated readiness to close.

IDAHO DAIRYMEN GET FEDERAL LOAN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—The farm board has approved a loan commitment of \$70,000 to the Upper Snake River Dairymen's association of Idaho Falls, Idaho.

DIRECTORIES GO TO TELEPHONE USERS

The News-Review's commercial printing department has just completed delivery of 2,700 telephone directories, which are being distributed to the patrons of the Roseburg exchange. The directory was compiled and edited under the direction of F. L. Crittenden, local manager, and was printed and bound by the News-Review company.

The directory contains all of the changes made since the issuance of the last previous book printed in June, and numerous additions and revisions have been made in the buyer's guide, the classified section of the directory, recently included for the convenience of telephone subscribers.

Wherever possible the telephone company is taking in the old directories, but in cases where subscribers are not at home, the former book has been allowed to remain. Patrons are asked to destroy the old directory, and to consult the new book before using the telephone, as several changes have been made in business and residence telephone numbers, and a check of these numbers in the new directory will save much confusion, both for the subscriber and the operators.
