

Development Reported in Reedsport During Year

**BONDED INDEBTEDNESS REDUCED
MORE THAN \$20,000 DURING 1930
AND MANY IMPROVEMENTS ADDED**

**New City Council Takes Over Reins With Conditions
Better Than in Many Past Years; Appointed
Officers Voluntarily Ask Cuts in
Salaries to Save Expense.**

REEDSPORT, Jan. 8.—Con-
cluding a year of very efficient
service, in which Reedsport made
excellent strides in progress and
development, the old city council
gave way to the incoming officers
at the regular meeting held Janu-
ary 5. Mayor Buck presided, with
Councilmen Foster, Burton, Ellis,
Reeves, Lillebo and West taking
office. Ex-councilmen Ford and
Weldner were also present. Other
city officers, Roy Cairns, treas-
urer; H. L. Chapin, recorder; pro-
gram; Wallace Benson, attorney; C.
C. Clarke, water commissioner;
Frank Cox, retiring marshal, and
Walter Boak, newly appointed mar-
shal, together with fifteen visitors
attended the meeting. After the
new councilmen had taken the oath
of office their first order of
business was the election of Coun-
cillman Ralph Foster as president,
to act in the absence of the mayor.
Mayor Buck appointed Council-
men Lillebo and Burton on the
water committee; Foster and Bur-
ton finance; Ellis and West, on
streets; Reeves and West, lights,
and Burton and Ellis, buildings.
John Bernhardt was reappoint-
ed fire chief; C. C. Clarke water
commissioner, and Wallace Benson
city attorney. The appointment of
Walter Boak as marshal was con-
firmed by the council.

Salary Cuts Requested
A very unusual happening oc-
curred when the water commis-
sioner, city attorney and city treas-
urer voluntarily requested salary
reductions. Water Commissioner
Clarke offered to accept \$25 less
per month until such time as con-
ditions of labor became more pro-
pitious. In view of the fact, how-
ever, that he is employed at a full-
time job, and is a very efficient
and industrious officer, the coun-
cil voted not to reduce his salary.
The councilmen commended him
very highly for his willingness to
make the sacrifice for the benefit
of the city. Slight cuts were made
in salaries of other part-time of-
ficers.

GLENDALE FIRE DEPARTMENT TO RECEIVE FEES

**Council Authorizes Fire-
men to Impound Loose
Animals and Collect
Involved Charge.**

GLENDALE, Jan. 8.—Members of
complaints regarding unattended
horses and cattle wandering about
the streets of Glendale, especially
after dark, trampling on lawns and
destroying flowers and gardens re-
ceived special attention at the
hands of the mayor and city coun-
cil at the regular meeting held
Monday evening.

The stricter enforcement of an
ordinance prohibiting stray cattle
and horses roaming at large was
turned over to the Glendale volun-
teer fire department, whose chief,
George F. Olinghouse, had just
appeared before the council with a
request for some additional fire
fighting equipment. Members of
the volunteer fire department were
given police power to enforce this
ordinance and all pound fees or
fines so collected to be used for
equipment as desired by the fire
department. The city recorder, W.
H. Losh, promised to cooperate
with the fire men in the matter
of finding any violator of the stock
law.

A cow belonging to J. S. Wood-
roffe was found rambling about in
Clara addition Tuesday afternoon
and Mr. Woodroffe contributed \$5
to the firemen's fund as a result.
Chief Olinghouse has already
made arrangements with Harry
Stumbo, owner of a fox farm on
Coyote creek, for the sale of such
horses and cattle as may be picked
up and on which the owners may
refuse to pay the pound fees or
fines by claiming they are more
than the value of the animal.

PORTLAND PLANS
OWN POWER PLANT

PORTLAND, Jan. 8.—The Port-
land city council yesterday adopt-
ed a resolution providing for "im-
mediate action" that Portland
might have a municipally owned
power and light plant. The resolu-
tion was introduced by Ralph C.
Clyde, who was elected on a public
ownership platform. The vote was
3 to 2.

The resolution declared the coun-
cil in favor of a municipally owned
and operated power system; au-
thorized Clyde as commissioner of
public utilities to proceed immedi-
ately with investigation of a
feasible method, and called on the
council to make available any or
all of the \$25,000 recently appro-
priated for power survey purposes.

MONEY VOTED FOR MORE PROH AGENTS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The
house yesterday passed the \$92-
000,000 first deficiency bill, includ-
ing \$543,370 for increased activi-
ties of the prohibition bureau.

The measure now goes to the
senate.

The prohibition bureau sum will
provide pay for 130 additional dry
agents during the remainder of the
year. This is the first quota of
500 additional agents requested by
Director Amos W. W. Woodcock
of the bureau.

The action came after the vote
had succeeded in having eliminat-
ed \$10,000 for prohibition educa-
tion purposes.

COOS BAY MILLS AGAIN OPERATING
