NEUNER REGARDED AS PROSPECT FOR FEDERAL BENCH

George Neuner, U. S. district attorney at Portland, former district attorney of Douglas county, and Lawrence T. Harris, Eugene attorney and ex-member of the state supreme court, are the two men most prominently mentioned in connection with President Hoover's forthcoming appointment of a successor to the late Robert S. Bean as judge of the federal bench at Portland. The choice of a new federal judge will rest chiefly with Senators McNary and Stelwer. Concerning the situation, the Portland

speculation with reference to Mr. Neuner was based on the supposition that he was slated some time ago to succeed Judge Bean when the latter should retire.

The efficiency with which Neuner has conducted the office of United States attorney, together with his high standing with the department of justice, are regarded as points of strength in his favor. The department of justice usually advises the president in reference to the qualifications of prospective appointees to federal judgeships.

Further, it may be urged in Neuner's favor that one update man is already on the federal bench here and that the appointment belongs to Portland. Mr. Neuner has been a resident of Portland sufficiently long to be regarded as a resident of this city.

Judge Harris retired from the supreme court of Oregon January 15, 1921, after a service of approximately nine years. He was highly regarded by members of the state bar and observers referred to him as exceptionally well qualified for such a position on the federal bench. When he resigned from the state bench, Judge Harris indicated that the salary of the office was so small that he was required to recoup his person fortunes in private practice.

Aside from his personal qualifications, Mr. J. R. Chaney returned to La Grande Sunday, where he is attending Eastern Oregon Normal school.
