

R. H. S. QUINTET SCORES 22-15 WIN OVER MYRTLE POINT

The Roseburg Senior high school basketball team defeated Myrtle Point, 22 to 15, in a very fast game played at the senior high gymnasium last night. The teams were very evenly matched in size and weight, the Roseburg players winning the game largely by ability in converting free throws. Roseburg made eight field goals and converted six free throws out of ten attempts. Myrtle Point secured seven field goals and converted three out of three fouls.

Both teams played a beautiful defensive game. Roseburg's offense was not working as fast as it should, and the players frequently failed to take advantage of good openings, a failure due largely to inexperience and a condition which will doubtless improve as the season advances. Myrtle Point exhibited little ability in the way of an organized defense, and four of its seven field goals were obtained on long shots from the center of the floor.

Durland, Entler Star
The defensive work of both teams, however, was exceptionally good. Durland and Entler, Roseburg guards not only completely smothered Myrtle Point plays coming into the basket, but were high scorers for Roseburg on offense. Durland, particularly, was a brilliant defensive player, while Entler, the only experienced player on the team, showed excellent ability in holding the team steady and in breaking up opposing formations.

Ostrander and Shelton, forwards and Wagner, guard, for Myrtle Point were the strong players on the visiting team. They were very accurate with long shots, and were also especially good in breaking up the Roseburg system under the basket.

of timber, making a total amount of \$1571,904.84. The counties in which this grant is located now receive 25 per cent from all sales. The report shows \$6,801,309.95 as total receipts obtained by the land office, with the money distributed as follows: Reclamation fund, \$3,167,791.64; public land states and counties, \$4,057,878.63; general land fund, \$754,342.96; Indian tribes, \$374,386.72.

Official Work Praised
The secretary of the Interior, in his annual report, which has been received at the local land office, cites numerous hardships under which the land office has been forced to operate during the past year and says that "every line of activity has increased during the past year despite handicaps."

The land office has succeeded admirably in discharging its difficult and highly technical work and its efficient and devoted to public service is not surpassed anywhere in the government.

The secretary recommends a more active participation on the part of the federal government in five construction through greater cooperation with the state. Private timber owners, he reports, are being forced to carry on much of the burden of fire protection on the Pacific coast.

During April, 1830, Jedediah Smith, David Jackson and William Sublette, St. Louis fur partners, cracked their bull whips, cried "ad-vance!" and led out a train of ten wagons, two deerhorns and eighty-one men on muleback—the first wagon train to turn on the northern route. They reached the foot of the Rockies, but Jed Smith, who had crossed the Sierras in mid-winter before any other white man, said the wagons could have gone right to the coast. Six years later, Dr. Marcus Whitman and the Rev. Henry N. Paulding with their young wives, proved it by traversing through to Fort Walla Walla where the British-Indian Jack then flew. In 1843 Whitman returned and led out a train of wagons—the advance guard of the emigration that won the Oregon-Washington country to the United States.

In 1872 Francis Parkman, an invalid New England youth, as a preface to his book, wrote these prophetic words:

"I remember that as we rode by the foot of Pike's Peak my companion remarked that a time would come when these plains would be a grazing country, the buffaloes give place to domestic cattle and farm-houses be scattered along the water courses."

Were Parkman living today he would see with his own eyes the progress of the West. In the old time West, the Indians to the Pacific between sun and sunset, surrounded by motor trucks and auto buses on the Lincoln highway, and he would also see re-created by humans the scene of a century ago and less than that by a company of thousands of serious pioneers and settlers.

age of the grange power bill. He has prepared a conservative plan which, he declares, he believes will be acceptable to all concerned, and will either incorporate its measure in the power program or will introduce a separate bill for legislative consideration.

He also proposes to introduce a measure amending the law applying to the lagging of meat to relieve the small farmer. The present law, which was passed to prevent the activities of cattle thieves, has been found to work a great hardship on the small farmer, and some more satisfactory plan is needed.

While he does not intend to lead the agitation, Senator Eddy plans to support the proposition of consolidating a number of the state boards, such as the agriculture and horticulture boards, dairy and food commissions, etc., into one organization which will have charge of all agricultural activities.

He is also to assist in tax legislation and will take an active part in the organization of the tax payables, excise and income tax measures to meet the objections raised by the supreme court.

He also plans to apply again for a special appropriation for the lower Umpqua community fair, which, through his efforts, has secured special assistance for several years.

Senator Eddy was an active contender early in the season for the office of president of the senate, but has withdrawn from the contest, leaving the field open to William L. Marks of Albany, who is expected to obtain the chair without any great opposition.

Fisher Outlines Plans

Walter Fisher, senior representative from Douglas county, expects to do most of his work during the session in committees. One of his first activities will be an effort to secure aid for the annual Northwest Turkey show at Oakland. He has not yet decided how this is best to be secured, but will take up the matter immediately upon reaching Salem.

Mr. Fisher, who is a member of the World War Veterans' State Aid commission, expects to be kept very busy with veterans' legislation. The commission itself will have several legislative matters to present, one in particular being the extension of time on bonus loans.

Mr. Fisher is also to take up a proposition requiring identification marks to traps as an aid to law enforcement, and to eliminate if possible, some of the losses to stock through poison bait.

Several important matters dealing with education, taxes, military affairs and highways will be considered as a part of special work during the session, Mr. Fisher expects, but as yet he has no definite program outlined in connection with any of these issues.

Nichols Seeks Economy

Ben Nichols, newly elected representative, who served as president of the Douglas County Taxpayers League last year, has been making a study of state laws with a view of applying more effective means for economy in district, county and state affairs.

One of the first matters in which he expects to engage is an effort to secure a more effective and operative budget system. One of the amendments he will propose will make administrative officials liable for any amounts spent in excess of the budget. This will apply to school districts, cities, counties, etc. He also plans to give considerable attention to the high school tuition law, which will be one of the chief tax issues of the legislature. Road laws are also to be suggested.

Mr. Nichols stated this morning, shortly before leaving for Salem, that he intends to propose state acquisition of land in scenic sections.
