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COST OF SEWER ABOVE ESTIMATE

GLENDALE, Jan. 13 — The Clara street sewer that its proponents estimated would cost about \$1200 has already cost the city nearly \$1800, according to a statement made by City Recorder W. B. Leach. At the regular council meeting held last Monday evening bills aggregating \$1218 were allowed and ordered paid. The major portion of these bills were for supplies on the Clara street sewer.

A report was read from the state health board that the water at the intake on Hill Creek, Glendale's new source of added water supply, shows larger bacteria count than water from Section Creek. Chlorination of the city's water supply was suggested as a remedy by the state health board.

The matter of placing a fire alarm box on the corner near the bank building was discussed. Councilman Hays proposed that anyone giving a false alarm or sounding the siren except for fire purposes be guilty of a misdemeanor and be fined accordingly, but action on this was deferred to another meeting.

Several complaints regarding stray horses and cattle were heard by the council and a stricter enforcement of Glendale's stray ordinance asked. The Glendale Volunteer Fire Department members were given police powers to enforce this ordinance with the promise that any fees or fines collected in this connection will be turned over to the fire department for equipment purchases.
