CHAIN OF SCHULTE STORES GOES INTO RECEIVER'S HANDS

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—A receiver was appointed today by Federal Judge F. G. Caffery for Schulte-United, Inc., a subsidiary of the Schulte Cigar Stores group and controlling a chain of ninety-seven stores dealing in men's and women's clothing.

Three creditors with aggregate claims of about \$3,000 filed a petition asking that the corporation be put into bankruptcy. Robert T. Lewis, attorney for Schulte-United, 70-cent to \$1 Stores, Inc., joined in the request and the receiver was named without opposition after counsel for Schulte-United, Inc., said it was in need of a receivership to conserve assets for the benefit of creditors and stockholders.

The petition for a receiver estimated assets of the corporation at \$9,000,000 and liabilities at \$16,000,000. The Irving Trust company was named receiver.

M. J. Whitman, vice-president of David A. Schulte, Inc., and a director of the bankrupt corporation, said the receivership was "the result of a combination of adverse circumstances, all of which grew out of the general business depression." The company, he said, had contracted long term leases at burdensome rentals and a decline in merchandise prices had resulted in heavy mark downs.

Millers, Inc., an affiliate of Schulte-United, Inc., operating upwards of thirty chain stores dealing in women's wear, was named in another bankruptcy petition filed by creditors who said liabilities of the concern totaled about \$1,250,000 and assets approximately \$1,000,000. A receiver was also named for it.

VESSEL BEACHED OFF SALMON RIVER

VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 14.—With a hole in her starboard bow where she crashed on a reef off Heceta Island, the motorship Northland, carrying 21 passengers to Ketchikan, Alaska, is on the beach off Salmon river. The steamer Salvage King left Victoria at midnight to go to her assistance and will arrive alongside at noon.

The Northland was enroute from Seattle, and carried a crew of 30.

Captain Leonard Williams, as soon as his vessel had shaken clear of the reef, turned and raced for the sloping beach off the mouth of Salmon river, two miles distant, on the Vancouver island side of the channel, and drove her upon the silt and shingle.

The motorship is owned and operated by the National Navigation company of Seattle.

B. & O. R. R. DENIED RATE CUT PERMIT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—The Baltimore and Ohio railroad was denied permission today to make through one-way tourist passenger rates from Washington to the Pacific coast and Rocky mountain territory.

The interstate commerce commission, rejecting an application to sell through tickets via New Orleans, Memphis, St. Louis and Chicago, using first class rates to those gateways and low coach or tourist sleeper rates west of the Mississippi, said no emergency was shown and statutory notice could not be waived. The rates would have become effective tomorrow.

The Southeastern Passenger association two weeks ago filed similar tariffs with the commission and was granted permission to sell through tickets.

The plan of the Baltimore and Ohio was to meet what it described as competitive conditions in the Washington district.

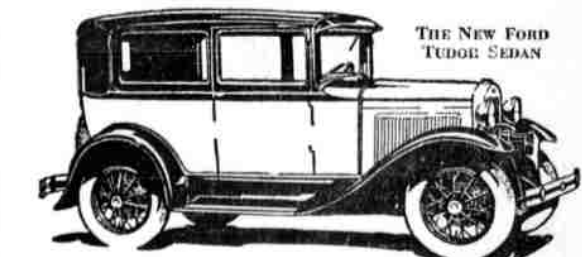
