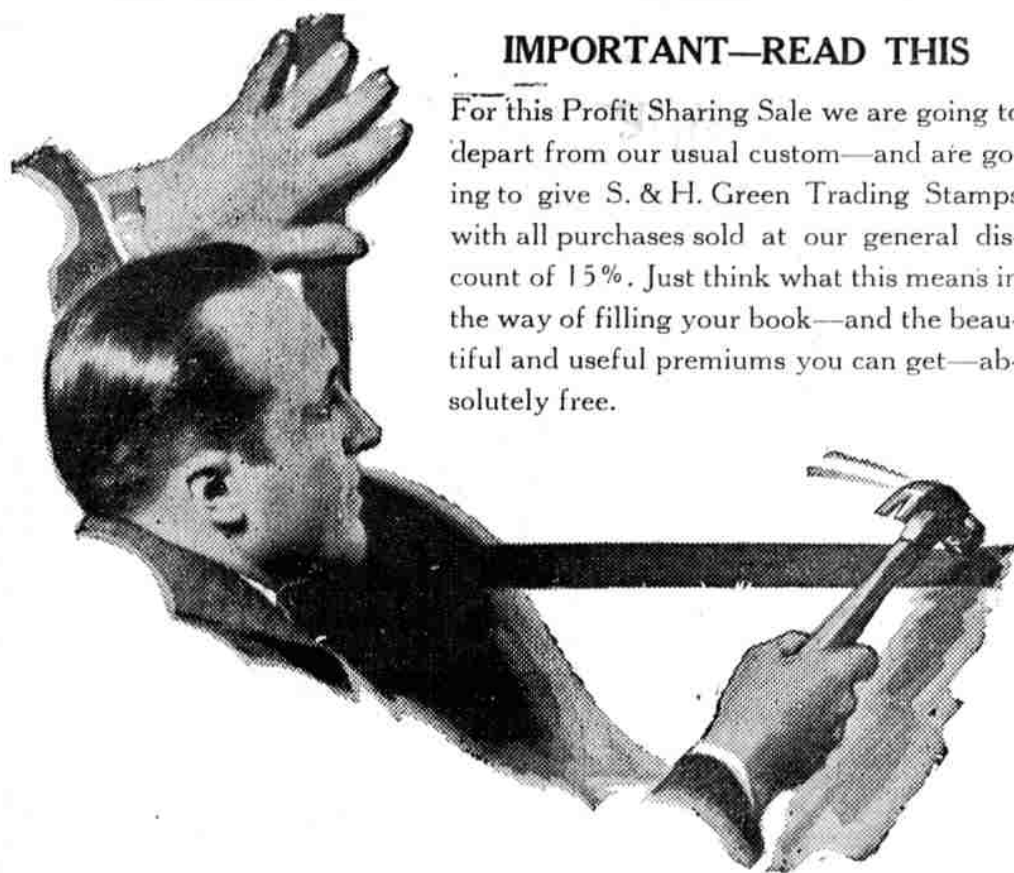

SPENCER 5 BEATS DRAIN; LIONS CLUB TIES WITH GLIDE

Spencer's basketball team last night defeated the Drain team at the Roseburg junior high school gymnasium, 35 to 25, in a very fast and interesting game. The Roseburg team, earlier in the season, won from Drain, 30 to 27, in a game at Drain.

The Roseburg team took a fairly good lead in the first half of the contest, the score standing 22 to 12 at half time, but in the third quarter Drain came back with a strong rally and brought the score to 26 to 29 at the end of the third period. Spencer's reserve strength, however, was too much for the Drain team and in the last quarter the Roseburg team obtained 12 points as compared with five for the visitors.

The game was very interesting to watch, as it was exceptionally fast, with both teams breaking quickly from offense to defense, and using clever floor formations in their attacks. Both played strong defensive games.

A preliminary between the Lions club team of the Roseburg city league and the Glide high school team gave the crowd a great deal of entertainment and ended in a tie, 11 to 11, after three extra periods. Glide led 8 to 5 at half time, and was still ahead at the third quarter, but in the final period the Lions tied the score 9 to 9. An extra three-minute period was allowed, and Romani for Glide and Whipple for Roseburg each tossed baskets and tied the score. A second overtime period was played, and neither side scored. The third period was then called and again there was no score, so the game was ended by mutual consent.

BELANGER GIVEN VERDICT OVER COOK

PORTLAND, Jan. 14.—Charley Belanger, Winnipeg light heavyweight, landed almost at will on the head and body of George Cook, Australian heavy, here last night, for 10 rounds, but did little damage. Belanger was awarded the decision. Cook was slow in getting started in his first appearance here. In the eighth round, however, he clipped Belanger a hard right on the ear, putting the Canadian down, but he was up before a count was started. Both were bleeding at the nose at the end of the battle.

Eddie Volk and Mickey Dolan, Portland lightweights, put on a fast six round draw, neither doing any damage.

Johnny Walker, Spokane middleweight, pounded out a six-round decision over Tommy Pratt, Portland.

Art Mayer, Portland heavy, won over "Sparkplug" Boyd, Aberdeen, four rounds, and Jimmy Lee, Portland Chinese, made short work of Floyd Bentz, Portland, finishing the battle in the first round with a left on the button.

SIKH SLAYS WIFE OF ARMY CAPTAIN

LAHORE, India, Jan. 14.—A former Sikh soldier who yesterday killed Mrs. A. G. Curtis wife of a British captain and wounded her two small children, was held today and will be charged with murder. "I am a congressite (member of the nationalist organization) and I am going to kill the general," said Singh shouted as he rushed on to the verandah of the bungalow, where Mrs. Curtis was seated.

After slaying her fatally with a sword he attacked her two daughters, seven and six years old. Police believe he mistook the bungalow for that of Lieutenant-General Sir Walter Leslie, commander of the Lahore division. He recently had concluded a six months' prison sentence on conviction of congress activities.

SCHMELING, STRIB SIGN FOR BATTLE

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—Max Schmeling and W. L. (Youngie) Stribling have signed for a heavyweight title bout to be held in June.

Under terms of a contract drawn up and signed yesterday, Schmeling and Stribling will meet in a city to be selected 90 or more days before the match, with the winner defending the title against Primo Carnera, Italian man-mountain, in September. Carnera arrived here from Europe yesterday.

Jack Sharkey apparently is left out in the cold, an outstanding contender in New York state with no one to fight.

O. S. C. HOOPSTERS BEAT IDAHO, 41-34
