

LOWER UMPQUA DEVELOPMENT IS TOLD IN REPORT

Large Audience at Annual Meeting of Reedsport Chamber Hears of Fine Progress.

REEDSPORT, Jan. 15.—The annual meeting and banquet of the Lower Umpqua chamber of commerce was held Monday evening in the Winchester Bay hotel, beginning at 7 p. m. The large dining room was attractively appointed for the occasion. About 100 guests sat down to a feast of roast turkey with all the accessories. Following the banquet, reports were made on the various activities of the year which came under the supervision of the chamber. President Hubert's report covered several of the departments. Concerning the bureau of rivers and harbors he reported that the chamber had urged completion of the Umpqua project. Senator McNary and Congressman Hawley have been entertained at the Umpqua chambers of commerce from Cottage Grove and Eugene have been entertained, representatives from which showed great interest, and endorsements of Roseburg and Drain have been secured.

The chamber cooperated in the distribution of a booster edition of the Port Umpqua Courier in September.

The changing of the Umpqua river coast guard station from the present unsatisfactory site to the south bank of the river is another enterprise attempted this year. Other projects were reported as follows:

Bureau of R. & S. In this department Mr. Hubert said that the chamber has cooperated in every particular and has arranged for the placing and maintenance of a large sign by Foster and Kleiser, placed just beyond Drain, advertising the beauties of the Coast highway.

Bureau of fairs. The plan for the community fair originated with the chamber of commerce, and that body assisted to the extent of providing the services of a paid secretary for seven months. West, Oregon Douglas County Fair association is the body now in charge of this activity, which it is hoped will be an annual affair, but the secretary of the chamber of commerce still has charge of the records.

Fish and game. Frank Taylor as chairman of this department has done all in his power to advertise the hunting and fishing facilities of this region.

The treasurer's report showed a fair balance on hand, despite the business depression.

W. A. Lovelace, chairman of the bureau of roads, reported on the present status of the worthy Stanley Caplin on the project of construction of the road on the section at fairs and W. A. Burdick on the action taken to investigate delinquency as condition.

Mr. Stubbacher, new police warden, was present and spoke of the abundance of wild life in this region, and the necessity of conserving it. The previously appointed nominating committee reported and the roll of officers for the coming year is as follows: President, R. J. Hubbard, vice-president, W. P. Reed, treasurer, H. McCrea, directors, W. A. Burdick, N. Hozan, W. A. Penner, W. A. Burton, Mr. Penner taking the place of Kay Chapman, who is moving away. The secretary is appointed by the directors from their number.
