NEW CELL BLOCK AT STATE PRISON WILL EASE CRUSH

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 15.—Moving day in the state penitentiary may come in the "hurry month" of May.

It is in that month, prison officials hope to transfer more than 150 prisoners from temporary quarters now provided in the basement of the main structure, to a new cell block now under construction, according to Henry Meyers, superintendent.

The moment the new structure is completed, more than half its capacity—320 inmates—will be placed in cells of the most up-to-date type containing every convenience of a modern building, Meyers said.

"The new building is being built entirely by prison labor," Meyers said. "Since the men are not skilled workmen, completion may come later than we hoped. It may be May first before we dedicate the new cell block."

The block will have four tiers, and will be constructed entirely of steel reinforced concrete. It will measure 66 by 155 feet. The basement will contain cells for solitary confinement. This part of the prison block will take the place of the old "bull pen" where prisoners under correction were placed. The latter feature of the prison will be destroyed, the "pen" being made an extension of the yard.

Each cell will be provided with modern plumbing features and contain hot and cold running water. Beds of the folding type will be provided to create roomier cells, Meyers said.

"The building will be absolutely fireproof," Meyers said. "Not a stick of wood will be contained in the structure on its completion."

CHECKS ISSUED BY CLARA'S EX-AIDE SHOWN AT TRIAL

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 16.—Can-celed checks, hundreds of them, by which the state contends it will prove Daisy De Roe embezzled \$16,000 from her erstwhile employer, Clara Bow, screen star, were the focal point of interest in the trial of the former secretary again today.

George Armstrong, auditor, sat in the witness stand most of yesterday describing the checks in detail, while the crowds that flocked to the courtroom for a glimpse of the red-headed actress during the previous four days dwindled away to a handful.

The checks, Armstrong explained, were a record of the special Clara Bow account, to which Miss De Roe had access for two years as Clara's secretary, and Miss De Roe's account. He said the record was not complete, in that checks amounting to approximately \$48,000 have disappeared.

Marjorie Fairchild, district attorney's investigator, who first questioned Miss De Roe and who obtained jewelry and love letters and telegrams from her safety deposit box, had a brief inning. She described some of the things found in the box. There was a diamond studded vanity case, she said, that Miss De Roe said she took from the actress' home because "Clara let her dogs play with it." Miss Fairchild testified the defendant freely admitted taking the things "because it was so easy to get them from a careless child like Clara."

Armstrong said some of the canceled checks bore such legends as "\$1 Clara borrowed from me," "\$29.60 for makeup for Clara," and "\$50 Clara's birthday present to me." He said all he found to represent the missing \$48,000 were a few check stubs marked "not used." Armstrong will continue on the stand today, with the state expecting to close its case before nightfall. Rex Bell, Miss Bow's "boy friend," was in court yesterday as her representative, but the actress herself put in no appearance. Bell said she would return today to hear "Daisy's explanation."

He said she was expected to be the first defense witness, and freely admitted she would have "some mighty interesting things to tell."

HEFLIN CHARGES ROBBERY AT POLLS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—A charge by Senator Hefflin, democrat, Alabama, that he was deflected for re-election last November by "theft of the ballot box" brought an assertion from his colleague, Senator Black, yesterday, that the election was "as fair as any election in any state in the United States."

Hefflin said he actually won the Alabama senatorial election by 100,000 votes.

"The ballot box (theft) of Tammany and Pittsburgh have nothing on my state," Hefflin said.

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DROUGHT RELIEF AID GIVEN 405,000

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—A Red Cross summary shows 405,000 persons being cared for by drought relief to 383 counties in 21 states.

The total amount of cash grants up to noon yesterday was \$614,781. Total expenditures for all types of relief food, clothing, medical supplies and feed for stock, was \$1,352,337.

Chairman Payne said calls for relief in Texas and Oklahoma counties have mounted in the past few days. Relief has been sent into all but nine of the 75 counties in Arkansas.

"Many Red Cross chapters which have been giving relief from local contributions have notified the national organizations they soon will be at the end of their resources," said Judge Payne. "The need for the \$10,000,000 relief fund is very great."

"We are sure however that response will be prompt and generous. From Florida, a state in which the Red Cross has given help in the past, came this telegram: 'People here have felt hard times but still have hearts as their response will show.'"

obscure shipping clerk during most of his 45 years.

Every Monday they gather in Benham's office, located in a small garage on the main street of this community of 8,000, to give him their wages and savings, receive his short-time judgment notes as security, or collect their interest at double or triple the usual rates. Benham's business, which he describes as "bargains," began two years ago among fellow workers in a factory here and have extended to Rockford, Elgin, Joliet, Kankakee, Chicago and other nearby cities. The first complaint, he said, was not from one of his customers but from local bankers who said his high financing had caused withdrawals of \$310,000 from Belvidere banks.

Omar H. Wright, president of the Second National bank here, former president of the Illinois Bankers' association and director of state finances, asked an investigation of Benham's affairs.

"I'm being investigated," Benham, a bald, robust man with a healthy manner, said today. "But I don't mind. Other investigators became customers. More money comes in. There's no law against borrowing money. Six per cent interest is all I promise. When I deliver more than is the customer's good luck."

Not a cent goes into the stock market, he said.

"There's no secret about it. My associates and I buy at low prices bankrupt stocks, automobiles, houses and other bargains offered by people who want to make quick sales. Then we sell quickly at a large profit. We always have a buyer before we buy ourselves. It simply depends on a prepared market and wise purchases."

WILLIAM A. JONES, NOTED MEDIC, DIES
