Roseburg held second place in the Coos-Douglas high school basketball conference by breaking even in two games played at the coast Friday and Saturday. The senior high school basketball team was nosed out 19 to 15 in the last three minutes of the game with Marshfield Friday night, but defeated North Bend 18 to 11 in the last quarter of a very fast game Saturday.

In the Friday game the Roseburg and Marshfield teams played one of the fastest and best games seen in the city. The score was very close throughout the entire contest until the last three minutes, when Marshfield, two points behind, sank three long baskets from the center of the floor. The game was very fast and exciting, showing brilliant defensive work.

At North Bend Saturday, Roseburg took the lead 5 to 2 in the first quarter, but was held scoreless in the second period, and the score was tied 5 to 5. Roseburg had a two-point lead, 10 to 8, at the end of the third period, but opened up with fast breaking in the last quarter to win 18 to 11.

The Roseburg team made its usual good showing in converting free throws, taking 7 out of 11 tries at Marshfield and 2 out of 3 at North Bend. Entler converted 6 out of 7 free throws at Marshfield. So far this season the local high school team in all games has scored 94 points as compared with 75 for their opponents.

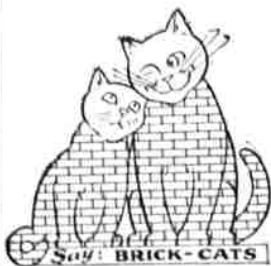
Grants Pass Next foe

"THE BIG TRAIL" TO RUN EXTRA DAY

Added Showing Compelled by Increased Interest in Western Talkie.

So much interest has been evidenced in "The Big Trail" that the management of the Indian theatre this morning announced it will be run an extra day. The picture was booked for Monday and Tuesday, but in order to give more people an opportunity to see it, the pioneer epic will be held over to run Wednesday.

Scores of pioneers have registered at the News-Review as guests of the newspaper. Tickets given these guests will be good at any performance during the three days. Matinees are at 1:30 p. m. and the evening shows start at 7 and 9 o'clock.

In filming "The Big Trail," reproduction of the pioneers' westward march 1800 cattle and 1400 horses were used. The cattle drew the 180 prairie schooners built for the picture. The horses carried the frontiersmen and Indians.

Although these animals went over every step of the 4300 mile trail, pulling the heavy wagons, engaging in Indian fights and duplicating the performances of their historic forerunners, not one died or suffered a serious injury. Such expert management of stock challenges the best work of the original pioneers.

MRS. E. H. BEAKE OF YONCALLA DIES

Mrs. Elizabeth Hanna Beake, 72, wife of Harry Beake, Yoncalla, passed away in Salem last Saturday evening after a long illness. She was born in England, May 12, 1858, and came to this country in 1892, first locating in Canada, and then moved to the United States, locating at Spokane where she was married to Mr. Beake. In the spring of 1912 she and her husband moved to Yoncalla, where they have since made their residence. Mrs. Beake was an active member of the Methodist church. She has no relatives in this country and is survived only by her husband. Services will be held in the Community church in Yoncalla, Tuesday afternoon at 2 p. m., with Rev. K. K. Clarke officiating. Interment will take place in the Yoncalla cemetery. Arrangements are in care of the Douglas Funeral home.

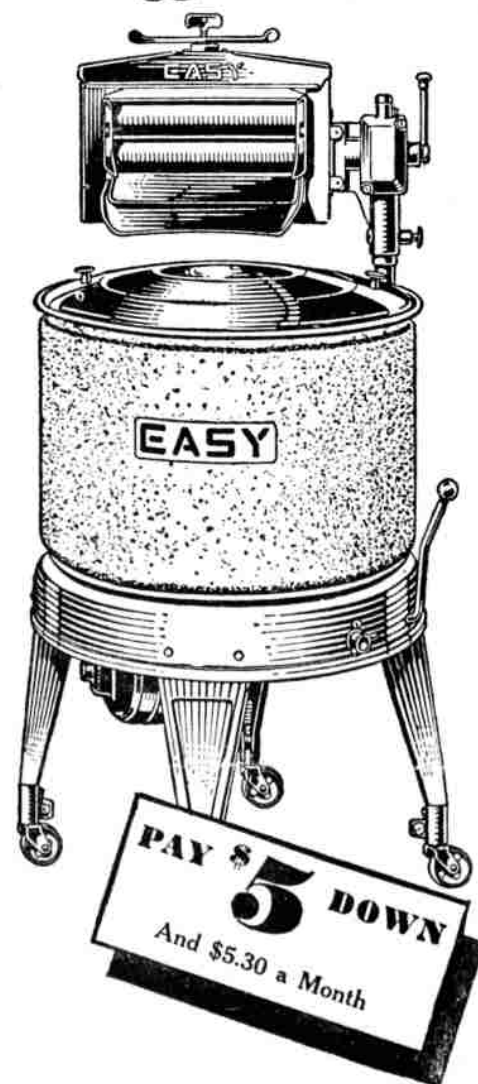
