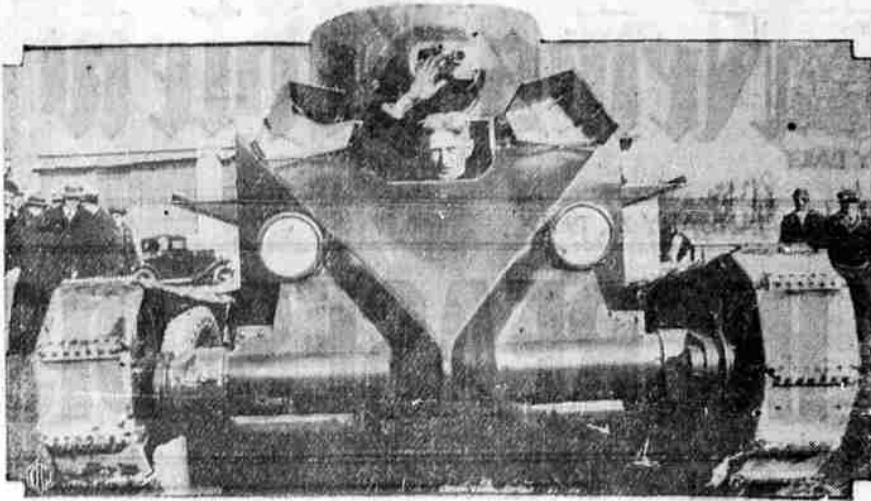
Tom Lillebo returned home on Monday from Portland, went to Coos Bay the same day, to Florence on Thursday and to Yachats on Wednesday.

PARENTS AND CHILDREN NOTICE
