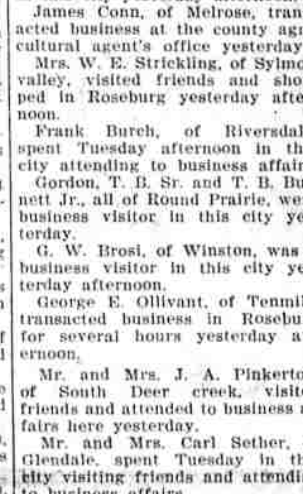

He defeated the experienced campaigner, Samuel McBride, who had two terms as the city's executive. The vote of 114,619 was the largest cast in the history of the city.

MOORE FORCED TO QUIT DAHACK QUIZ



MEDFORD, Jan. 21.—Willis N. Moore, assistant attorney general, detailed to conduct a special grand jury investigation into the death of Everett Dahack of Eagle Point, killed during a liquor raid six weeks ago, left for Portland today for medical attention. He is suffering from a cold and general run-down condition. He was stricken on the first day of the investigation. The special grand jury investigation has been discontinued until a new special prosecutor can be assigned.

ECONOMY RUN FOR WOMEN AUTOISTS, GILMORE CO. PLAN

For the third successive year the Gilmore Oil company is staging an official economy run for women drivers exclusively. The run this year will be from Los Angeles to Wrightwood mountains, a distance of 200 miles by a circuitous route down the coast and thence into the mountains. "Our previous economy run created such widespread comment that we concluded to hold another one this year on Friday, February 13," says Earl B. Gilmore, president of the Gilmore Oil company. "It is a fitting day and date for the contestants to settle once and for all their superstitious about luck or lack of luck. "Practically the same route and rules that were effective last year will be adopted this year. The event will again be held under the sanction and supervision of the contest board of the American Automobile association as a stock car run and the results will be accorded national recognition. All details of the contest are entirely in the hands of A. A. officials from start to finish. "There will be a revision of classes due to the change in prices of six and eight cylinder cars. The cars will be divided into six classes depending on the factory prices. Any car registered for the first time since June 1, 1929, is eligible."

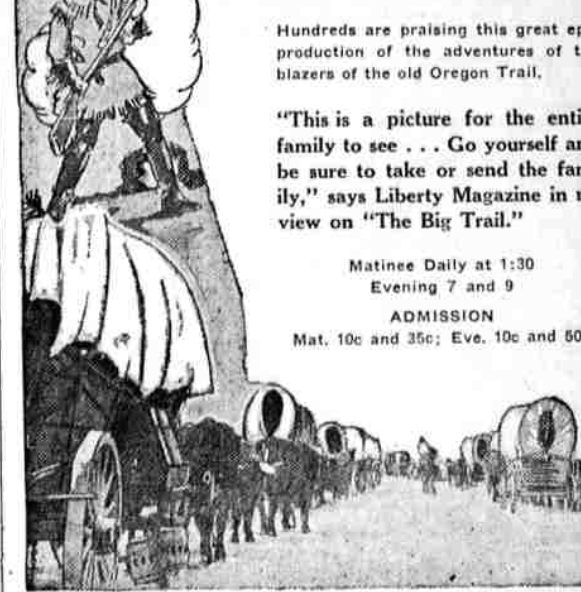
