REPENTANCE AND FUTILE EXCUSES. LOWRY'S SUBJECT

REVIVAL ANNOUNCEMENTS

Tonight 7:30—Subject, "How Every Excuse of Man Condemns God." Friday 2:30—"Some Essentials of a Growing Church." Friday 7:30—"The Unanswerable Question."

Another large audience greeted the evangelist yesterday afternoon, when he spoke on the "Second Coming of Christ" and the "Millennium." Dr. Lowry announced that the subject for Friday afternoon should prove to be one of the most helpful, and he hoped one of the most practical of all these afternoon Bible studies. He again commended the people for their faithful attendance and great interest that had been manifested in these special Bible studies.

When speaking of the Judgment last evening, Dr. Lowry emphasized one point in particular, and that was that men would be judged for the deeds done in the body, in other words, what they are doing now, and not what they do after they leave this world. He said: "If I felt that God had called me to preach the gospel in China, I would go as willingly as I left my home to come to Roseburg. But there is one place where I will never preach the gospel, and that is out here in your cemetery. I will never stand there among those tombstones and plead with those bones to come to Christ. No sir, what you and I do about this matter will determine our fate and the gate of the cemetery. What you and I do we must do before the doctor puts his finger upon your pulse and bids your weeping wife and loved ones to prepare for the worst. What you and I do must be done before our loved ones shall bathe their handkerchiefs in their tears, as we pass out into eternity. 'It is appointed unto man once to die, but after this the judgment.' With these and many other earnest appeals Dr. Lowry urged men to flee from the day of wrath and vengeance of Almighty God. When the invitation was given a number responded.

In announcing the subject for this evening, Dr. Lowry especially urged the people to invite the business and professional men as he had always found the subject especially helpful to men. The subject will be, "How Every Excuse of Man Condemns God."

Dr. Oscar Lowry chose for his text last night Acts 17:30-31, "But now, He commandeth all men, everywhere, to repent, because He hath appointed a day in which He will judge the world in righteousness by that man whom He hath ordained; whereof He hath given assurance unto all men, in that He hath raised Him from the dead."

My theme for tonight is "The Judgment Day," commented the speaker. There are four judgments spoken of in the scriptures and while they are closely related, yet they are distinct one from the other.

First, there is a judgment of the believer's sins. This judgment takes place at the cross and is paid. But though that be true, I find many professors of religion who are not under bondage and fear of the judgment to come. The true believer will never come into judgment for sin. If sin, He said, "I am, who knew no sin, He made to sin for us, that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him. He took the judgment due us for sin upon Himself on the cross. I Peter 2:24, 'Who His own self bear our sins in His own body on the tree, that we being dead to sin, might live unto righteousness.' Jesus says distinctly, 'That the believer will not come into judgment.' That is, for sin. John 3:25, 'Verily, verily, I say unto you, he that believeth my word, and believeth on Him that sent Me hath everlasting life, and shall not come into judgment, but is passed out of death into life.'"

The second judgment spoken of is the judgment of believers for their works. This judgment will take place at the coming of the Lord at the end of this age, 11 Cor. 5:10, "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that everyone may receive the things done in his body according to what he hath done whether it be good or bad." This passage speaks primarily of the Christian's judgment as the context will show. So, while the Christian will not come into judgment for sins, we see that they are to be judged as to their works.

In a city in the northwest Iowa confederate the pastor of the First Methodist church was called to visit a dying man. When he entered the room he saw a young man on whose brow was the stamp of death. "Are you ready for the change?" asked the minister. "I'm not afraid to die, but I'm not ready." "How is this?" said the pastor. "Not afraid, but not ready?" "I do not understand." "I will tell you," said the young man. "Six months ago I was converted when sick in a hospital."

"The young people of the church visited and prayed with me, and gave myself to Christ. I know I belong to Christ now. I do not feel ready to die—I have won not one soul for Him who saved me, and if I die now I shall go into His presence without a friend. Oh, if I could live but a little longer that I might bring someone to Him."

That is, doubtless, a picture of many here tonight. You yourself may not be afraid to die, having given yourself up to Christ, but are you ready? We are saved through Faith; we will certainly be re-

warded according to our faith.

The third judgment will be the judgment of nations. This judgment takes place at the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ, with His holy angels. Matt. 25:31-32, "When the Son of Man shall come in His glory and all the holy angels with Him, then shall He sit upon the throne of His glory and before Him shall be gathered all nations. And He shall separate them one from another, as the shepherd divideth his sheep from the goats. As might be shown from many passages this judgment takes place immediately after the great tribulation, and it is a judgment of living nations and not a judgment of the resurrected dead, for his passage says distinctly, 'And before Him shall be gathered all nations.'"

A great many have confounded this with the fourth judgment of which I want to speak, which is the judgment of the great white throne spoken of in Revelation, the 20th chapter.

It is of the last judgment that I want to speak at length tonight—the judgment of the great white throne. Rev. 20:11-15, "And I saw a great white throne, and Him that sat upon it, from whose face the earth and the heaven fled away; and there was found no place for them. And I saw the dead, both great and small, stand before God; and the books were opened, and another book was opened, which is the book of life. And the dead were judged out of the books according to their works. And the sea gave up the dead which were in it, and death and hades gave up the dead which were in them; and they were judged, every man according to their works. And death and hades were cast into the lake of fire, which is the second death, even the lake of fire. And whosoever was not found written in the book of life was cast into the lake of fire."

First, I direct your attention to the certainty of judgment. There are two events that are absolutely certain. It is certain that Jesus Christ is coming back again to receive His people unto Himself and to reward them according to their works; and in the second place, it is certain that Jesus Christ is coming in judgment upon this world. Men, you may turn this matter off lightly if you please, but that doesn't for one moment change the fact that there is a judgment.

Men made light of Noah and his message. But it came to pass just as he said it would and the people of the earth were destroyed by the flood. The men of Sodom and Gomorrah laughed at the idea of there being a rain of fire and brimstone—they even tried to slay the angels that were sent to warn them, but it came to pass just as God said it would. Jesus said, speaking of the temple, that one stone should not be left upon top of another. The people did not believe Him; they took and crucified Him, but it came to pass just as He said it would. Peter, centuries ago, told us that people would scoff at the idea of Christ's return and the judgment.

Hear his words in 1 Peter 3:4-5, "Knowing this first thing that shall come in the last days, scoffers, walking after their own lust and saying, For since the fathers fell asleep all things continue as they were from the beginning of creation." It is a strange thing, but true, nevertheless, that there are men always ready to scoff and make light of God's warning concerning the future judgment. But what is the assurance here given in this text that there shall be a judgment day?

The fact of the resurrection of Jesus, "Because God hath appointed a day in which He will judge the world in righteousness whereof He hath given assurance unto all men, in that He hath raised Him from the dead." The fact of Christ's resurrection is one of the best authenticated facts of history. And God said, "As surely as Jesus was raised from the dead, just that sure there will be a judgment."

Men will be judged for their secret sins. Romans 2:15, "In that day when God shall judge the secrets of men by Jesus Christ according to my gospel." Some folks would rather go into the meat shop and have their hand chopped

off at the wrist than to have their sins revealed, and the only reason they can hold their heads up is because of the consciousness they have that no one can read the awful record they have been making, but it will be brought out in the judgment.

"Men, you can cover your sins but they will have a resurrection. Every wicked deed, every midnight carousal, every act of debauchery will meet you in the judgment, unless your sins are washed away now by the blood of Jesus Christ."

"Some of you have been guilty of blasphemy, probably you have blasphemed your lips this very day with some vile oath; you have probably been repeating some vile story. Remember, Jesus said, 'But I say unto you that every idle word that men speak, they shall give an account thereof in the day of judgment.'"
