She was a native of Fulton county, Indiana, and was married at Louisville, in that state, to Lewis F. Lozier on November 18, 1889. Mr. and Mrs. Lozier came here from Medford to reside four years ago. They celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary last November.

Surviving Mrs. Lozier are her husband, a son, J. W. Lozier, and a daughter, Mrs. Pearl Rector, both residing in Roseburg. She also leaves nine grandchildren, three great grandchildren and the following brothers and sisters: Wilbur, of Medford, Oregon; Charles, of Tigard, Oregon; Charles Pleister of Medford, Oregon; Mrs. Ella Palmer of Tippecanoe, Ind., and Mrs. Clara Clayhall of Elma Green, Ind. Three children preceded Mrs. Lozier in death, two passing in infancy and a third dying in Medford in 1910.

Mrs. Lozier's remains will be taken to Medford for interment, with services to be held at the Baptist church in that city at 2 p. m. Saturday and conducted by Rev. R. H. Shoup, assisted by Rev. W. H. Eaton. Burial will occur in the I. O. O. F. cemetery at Medford. Preceding removal of the remains from Roseburg they will lie in state at the Douglas Funeral home from 3 p. m. today until 8:30 Saturday morning, when friends may call.
