BEAT GRANTS PASS

Indians Have Easy Contest After First Half, Final Score Being 26-7.

The Roseburg senior high school Indians scalped Grants Pass high school 26 to 7 in a very fast game of basketball played at the Roseburg senior high gym Saturday night. Outplaying their rivals in every branch of the game, the Indians ran up a wide margin in the second half of the game, after playing on even terms in the first period.

The first two quarters were hotly contested, both teams playing a fast defensive game with few attempts made at the basket. Roseburg scored two field goals in the first period. Covert dropping in a snap shot from under the basket, while Johnson followed with the second from the tip-off of the next play. Grants Pass failed to score during the quarter.

McGuire, Grants Pass forward, made the first score for the visitors when he converted a free throw. Ferguson and Covert added three more for Roseburg on a foul toss and a long shot at the basket, while Johnson, Grants Pass guard, scored the first field goal for the visitors just before the half ended, with a score of 7 to 3.

Second Half One-Sided—The Indians completely changed their style in the second half, and succeeded in running up a wide margin within a few minutes of play. Breaking into their opponents' territory with fast, short passes, Entler and Covert ran up the score very rapidly, with Ferguson, Durland and Palm each annexing a field goal, making the

score 19 to 3 at the end of the third period.

Bennett annexed a basket for Grants Pass at the opening of the fourth quarter, and Flory followed a moment later with another, completing the scoring for the visitors. Roseburg continued its fast offensive, and at the same time maintained an airtight defense, which Grants Pass could not break through.

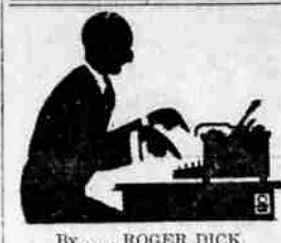
YONCALLA QUINTET

If the Beavers can do that, they will be tied with the Huskies at the top of the division and the northern team's chances of winning another championship will be gravely endangered.

If Oregon State can't take Washington for both games little short of a miracle can prevent the latter from winning the title. Its record so far is perfect—six straight victories.

The University of Oregon quintet was buried even deeper in the cellar by two losses to Washington last week at Eugene, 31-26 and 28-
