UPPER SILESIA IS ROCKED BY QUAKE

BERLIN, Jan. 28.—A violent earthquake shock was felt this morning at Hindenburg in upper Silesia and through the Katowitz district. Damage was believed to have been comparatively slight.
The province of Katowitz, about 40 miles from Krawow, is an iron mining district. The capital, also called Katowitz, has a population of about 32,000.
In the town of Hindenburg, not far from the capital of the province, the inhabitants were panic stricken, but there were no reports of casualties.

LONDON, Jan. 28.—The air ministry today announced the seismograph at Kew Observatory recorded a violent earthquake last night and a second of smaller proportions this morning. The epicenter of the first was estimated near the southwest border of China. The direction of the second was not known but the distance was estimated at 1260 miles.

SENATE PASSES BILL ON INDIAN CLAIMS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Senator McNary's bill to authorize submission of claims of the Grande Ronde Indians to the United States court of claims passed the senate yesterday. This includes the Alsea, Siletz, Coos Bay, Rogue River and neighboring tribes. Another bill passed by the senate makes national forest regulations for fire protection applicable to the lands of the Coos Bay wagon road grant.

BIG CAMAS WORK TO BE INSPECTED

Vernon Harpham, supervisor of the Umpqua National forest, and Fred Asam, district ranger in charge of the North Umpqua district, are leaving this afternoon on an inspection trip to Big Camas. Two employees have been spending the winter at the Big Camas station doing improvement work, and the officials will view work performed. A new barn is being completed, the pasture increased, blacksmith shop completed, office building enlarged and shakes cut for use on forest shelters.
