PENSION FUND BILL UP FOR DECISION

SALEM, Jan. 29.—Whether the Multnomah delegation will join with the Portland firemen and policemen in backing their request for allotment of \$200,000 annually for their pension funds will be decided today, when the delegation will meet in executive session.
Yesterday's delegation meeting brought addresses by Captain Frank Irvine, of the police department and Horace Meeklem, Portland insurance man. Meeklem advocated that the fire and police proposals be referred, with the understanding that a system similar to that operating for teachers be submitted.
This could be done, Meeklem declared, with funds now coming into the police and firemen's pension fund. About two years would be required to work out the system, he believed.
The delegation heard from the Portland school district on two matters, one referring to application of the workmen's compensation act to school janitors, and the other to desire of the district to increase their tax base to make unnecessary the annual special school election. Superintendent Rice spoke for the district.
