Add 1 pint milk and mix thoroughly. Pour into large or individual baking dishes, sprinkle with paprika and bake in a very slow oven until firm. A layer of coarsely chopped ham on the bottom of the dish gives a delightful flavor.

Empty 1 can of Spaghetti (medium size) and 1 can thick Meat Soup (oxtail, mul-tigutawny or mock turtle) into a baking dish. Add seasoning if necessary. Cover with crumbs and brown in oven.
