

CASE'S BODY FOUND IN RUINS OF PLANE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 30.—Carrying the body of Walter E. Case, Varney air lines pilot who was killed in a plane crash on Bluff mountain, near Washougal, Wash., eight days ago, a party of forest rangers and company officials reached Portland today. They had marched with a pack train all night long after reaching the wreck late yesterday.

A postal inspector recovered 250 pounds of mail carried by the plane.

Leon Cuddeback, vice-president of the Varney company, said it was apparent Case had been in the dense fog which obscured the course. He was found in the cockpit. Injuries indicated he had been killed instantly when his head hit the instrument board.

Company officials found the plane badly wrecked. They burned it.

possession a certificate of sale. Senator Woodward's bill which would give blind persons preference in granting of licenses to operate stands in state-owned or state-leased buildings was killed by indefinite postponement.

Dog Supervisors Asked.

Appointment of a resident supervisor of dogs in the county is proposed in a bill received by the house. Salary of the supervisor is determined by the dog population of the county and varies from \$150 to \$250 to be paid from a special dog fund. The bill raises the license fee to \$3 and \$5 for male and female dogs respectively. Kennel owners or breeders will be subject to a \$10 license fee and must notify the supervisor when an animal has been sold.

Dog owners must have kind-dispositioned animals, and must not maintain a vicious dog or one "which bites and snaps at persons upon the public streets and highways or which habitually barks and howls so as to be a nuisance to neighbors and discomfort." Three persons can petition relief from the annoyance through the supervisor. Any dog which kills or maims or chases sheep or goats or other domestic animals is deemed a public nuisance and if found engaged in the practice may be killed by the person making the discovery.

Insurance Bills Appear.

Two measures pertaining to insurance companies were introduced. One of these fixes the minimum tax on foreign or alien insurance companies at not less than \$1000 per annum and sets forth a scale of fees. Under another bill casualty and insurance companies qualified to do business in Oregon may use the merit of experience rating plan in connection with other risks. Rating schedules and policy forms must be filed with the state commissioner.

long after the book was famous, "Bad John" was converted, and was baptized in Dole Camp creek while hundreds of relatives and friends looked on.

He had little more than the cabin and enough to meet his simple wants, yet as a young man he sold for \$10 an acre property near Jenkins, Ky., that later was worth millions because coal was discovered under the hills. He was born in Letcher county, Ky., near the Virginia border, the son of Joel Wright, a pioneer.

Fought in Civil War—Although the most active fighter

of a century of his life was that in which he had served as a law officer, Wright had early experience in fighting. Prior to his feudist days he had fought in the Civil War. He entered the war in the Confederate army, he said, but was captured and after a term in military prison at old Fort Smith was released on his promise not to go below the Ohio river. Later he went into the Union army as a substitute for a youth who had been drafted and who under Union military regulations then prevailing was able to hire a man to take his place. In his later years Wright drew a pension as a Union veteran.

VOODOOISTS SAID TO HAVE SLAIN BOY

HAVANA, Jan. 30.—Voodoo worshippers in the hills of the interior were charged yesterday by Mariano Torres, sub-inspector of the judicial police, with having kidnapped and sacrificed the white child, Martin Perez, in their weird rites.

The boy was kidnapped Christmas eve from a plantation near Artemisa. Torres, who investigated, said the boy had been sacrificed by the voodooists in the belief the blood of a white child was needed to cure the mortal disease of a woman. The same cure was to have been applied, he said, to another woman. Several persons have been arrested and charged with witchcraft.

The body of the Perez boy had not been found.

Dan Flynn: also 26, light complexion, blue eyes, blond hair, weight 150 pounds, height five feet nine inches and medium build. A \$50 reward is offered for the capture of each.

BELIEVED IN PORTLAND, WHERE FLYNN HAS FRIENDS

PORTLAND, Jan. 30.—State officers and Portland police were today searching this city for Lee Duncan and Dan Flynn, who escaped last night from Oregon state prison.

DEEDS HERE STAMP DUNCAN AS DANGEROUS CRIMINAL

Lee Duncan, who escaped last night from the state penitentiary, was one of the most dangerous prisoners ever confined in the county jail, according to ex-Sheriff Sam Starnier and George Sewell, who was first deputy under Starnier in April, 1925, when Duncan was arrested.

Duncan was first apprehended after he had perpetrated five robberies in Roseburg. His method of procedure was to let himself down through a skylight by means of a rope.

While confined to the county jail he broke up a heavy china teacup and stuffed the pieces into a stocking. When George Sewell, who was acting in the capacity of jailer, carried the noon meal into the jail, Duncan struck him over the head with the improvised "saw," knocking the officer unconscious, and made his escape.

Found in Hiding—He went over the hills into the Roberts creek section, and after drawing the officers into the district circled back into Roseburg, entering a vacant house on South Main street, where he hid out for several days.

He entered the J. C. Penney company store and proceeded to fit

himself with a complete new outfit of clothing, purchased shaving equipment and shaved himself, loaded a suitcase with garments and went out over the front transom.

He went into hiding in Umpqua park, where he was discovered by some boys, who reported him to the officers with the result that he was again captured.

Second Trial Fails—He made another attempt to escape a few days later, luring Deputy Sheriff Shambrook into the jail and locking him in one of the individual cells, being assisted by another prisoner held on a charge of manufacturing liquor. Another officer, however, was standing guard and blocked the attempt to escape.

He was sentenced to five years each on five burglary charges being given an additional sentence of 10 years for assault on an officer, making a total sentence of 35 years.

Parole Opposed

District Attorney Cordon recently received an application for parole in which Duncan's brother joined, promising to be responsible for the young man's behavior. The court officers, however, refused to recommend a parole for him.

Officers have been informed that Duncan has been one of the incorrigibles at the state prison and has spent a good part of his time in the "bull pen." Sheriff Jackson stated this morning that he had received no direct announcement from penitentiary officials regarding the prison break.
