

INDIANS PRIMED TO BEAT COQUILLE

R. H. S. Basketeer Machine
Clicks Smoothly for
Game Tonight.

The Roseburg Indians hope to add another scalp to their belt tonight when they tangle with Coquille high school in another conference game of basketball. Coquille has a fast team, white. Like Roseburg, has suffered only one defeat so far this year. At present Marshfield holds the lead in the Southwestern Oregon league by virtue of having won all games, including those with the Roseburg and Coquille teams. Roseburg will have a chance to even the honors with Marshfield, however, on Friday, February 13, which the local boys believe will be their lucky day.

The games played so far this season have resulted as follows: Jan. 9, Marshfield 29, Coquille 11; Jan. 9, Roseburg 22, Myrtle Point 15; Jan. 16, Coquille 27, Myrtle Point 25; Jan. 16, Marshfield 19, Roseburg 15; Jan. 17, Roseburg 15, North Bend 11; Jan. 23, Myrtle Point 15, Bandon 14; Jan. 23, Coquille 33, North Bend 15.

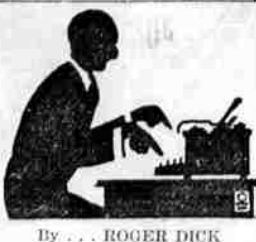
Tonight Coquille is playing at Roseburg. Marshfield is playing at Myrtle Point, and North Bend is playing at Bandon.

Locals Go At Good Pace
The Roseburg team plays a very close checking game, as will be observed by the fact that the games in which the Indians have played have been featured by low scores. In the early part of the season the local boys were slow in their offense, and so relied chiefly on a strong defensive system. In their last game, however, played against Grants Pass, which was not a conference game, they ran up a score of 26 to 7, maintaining their strong defensive system, but at the same time showing an improved offense ability.

Coquille, it will be noticed, defeated North Bend 33 to 15, Roseburg won from the same team 18 to 11. Marshfield beat Coquille 29 to 11 and won from Roseburg 19 to 15. Roseburg defeated Myrtle Point 22 to 15, while Coquille beat the same team 27 to 25 in an overtime period. These scores would indicate that Roseburg has a much stronger defense than Coquille, and tonight's game will show whether or not the basket-shooting ability of the Indians has improved sufficiently to overcome the margin that Coquille's scores would indicate that team possesses in offense.
