

CONIFER LUMBER COMPANY MILL TO BE OPERATED

(News-Review Douglas County Special)
GLENDAL, Jan. 30—The Conifer Lumber company's sawmill located nearly 17 miles from the city on the Astoria-Ancient road, will be placed in operation under a cooperative labor plan within a few days, according to H. S. Stevenson, who will have charge of operations.

The mill has a capacity of 20 thousand feet of lumber per day and employs about 10 men. It was purchased by H. S. Stevenson and his father, Renshaw Stevenson, doing business as the Conifer Lumber company, last July. The mill has not been operated recently because of the demoralized condition of the wholesale lumber market. Under the proposed operating plan the sawmill workmen will receive no daily wages but will, in lieu of regular wages, divide proportionately according to their jobs and amount of time employed, a fixed percentage of the sale price received for lumber.

The Conifer Lumber company will have charge of the sales and shipping. The hauling of the lumber from the mill to the railroad loading tracks in this city will be under contract to C. R. Springer. A contract to supply logs to the mill has been made with John Bowman of Myrtle Creek, who has been logging operations last week.

He left Cow Creek September 17, 1930, driving a team of oxen behind a covered wagon equipped to a trailer wagon.
