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Tax On Oleo

THE house of representatives of
our national congress just
passed a bill containing a tax on
oleomargarine.

House bill 180, introduced by
one-third of the members of the
lower house of the Oregon legisla-
ture if passed will impose a tax of
ten cents a pound on all oleomargarine.
This will also most un-
doubtedly pass. House bill 167 in
the Oregon legislature provides for
licensing the sale of oleomargarine
and also provides a tax of four
cents a pound on white and seven
cents a pound on colored mar-
garine.

We must assume that one or the
other of these Oregon bills will be
withdrawn, for obviously they per-
tain to the same thing. It is likely,
furthermore, that number 167 will
be withdrawn inasmuch as number
180 carries the names of so many
members of the house.

This is a great dairying county.
The dairy industry from the stand-
point of dollar income is second
only to the lumber industry. At
this time, with lumber in a de-
pressed condition, the dairy indus-
try is probably the leading indus-
try in this county.

A tax on butter substitutes which
will help to equalize the price of
butter and oleo, will naturally
mean an increase in the consump-
tion of butter. With only a few
cents difference in price scarcely
anyone would wish to use the sub-
stitute.

Butter is a food, a food almost
necessary to life. If a tax on sub-
stitutes will have the effect of putting
butter on the tables of more fam-
ilies, that alone is a pretty good
reason for establishing the tax
provided in this legislation.

This writer has some doubt as to
the "farm relief" qualities of this
legislation to tax butter sub-
stitutes. Various recent surveys
have shown that substitutes for
butter are purchased pretty gen-
erally by people in the rural dis-
tricts. No survey that we know has
been conducted in this county so
whether or not this condition, which
is said to be national, exists
here, is not known.

Our dairy industry will be ben-
efited by a tax on butter sub-
stitutes. If living costs on farms are
raised slightly as a result, we have
the consolation of knowing in any
case that butter is a real food and
should be served at every meal,
and used in cooking.

The Portland health department
reports the beginnings of a "flu"
epidemic. Let's remember 1918 and
subsequent epidemics and be on
our guard. It would be a mighty
good plan to keep children with
colds home from school. Teachers
should even send home children
who have had colds. Preventive
measures of this sort will help a
great deal in the event an epidemic
is actually headed this way.
