POULTRY INDUSTRY PROMISED REVIVAL

PORTLAND, Feb. 6—A bright

ray of economic sunshine, calculated to revive and nourish the languishing hopes of Oregon poultry and egg producers who for many weeks have nervously wringed under the cloud of market oversupply with its consequent depression of prices to levels figured below cost of production, yesterday reached the state by telegraph from Kansas City.

This, Dixon avers, is almost certain evidence that poultry on the farms of the nation will be reduced approximately 65 per cent next August, over-production will be eliminated and Oregon poultrymen who "stay in the game" will be assured living prices again for eggs.

4 eggs 2 cups milk 2 tbsp. melted 1 cup corn meal 2 tsp. shortening 1 tbsp. sugar 2 tsp. baking powder 1 tsp. salt

Scald milk and salt in double boiler and pour over corn meal. Cool. Add sugar and beaten eggs. Stir in baking powder and last the melted shortening. Beat well. Bake in greased deep baking dish in moderate oven (350 degrees) for about 45 minutes. Spoon out and serve with butter.
