

LOMSKI, MANLEY BATTLE TO DRAW

Light Heavyweights Stage
Fight That Pleases Big
Portland Crowd.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 11.—Portland's municipal auditorium was filled to capacity last night to see Leo Lomski, Aberdeen, Wash., light heavyweight, and George Manley, former Denver locomotive engineer, put on one of the best exhibitions of fistcrafts seen here. It was declared a draw, because the judges and referee could not agree. One decision was for Manley, one for Lomski and one a draw.
Lomski, working under a big handicap against Manley's long reach, never faltered, although Manley took the play from him in the early rounds. In the fourth Manley reached across with a shoulder-high right that opened a gash close to Lomski's left eye. He continued to peck away at the injured optic. Lomski seemed hurt and bothered, but he never faltered. From the sixth round on, it was pretty even. Lomski's right hand blows told on Manley. Manley's best blow was his left to the head. Lomski demonstrated his ability to take as well as give. It was a great fight between two of the best light heavyweights in the business and the decision hurt nobody. Lomski outwitted Manley 180 to 174, but Manley had a decided advantage in height and reach.
Frisco McGale, Seattle middleweight, took a six-round decision from Swede Nelson, Vernonia in the semi-windup. Art Mayer, Portland heavyweight, won over Harry Nathan, Portland, in another six-round affair.
Al Straub, Portland middleweight, knocked out Lee York, Oregon City in the second of a four-round affair. Roy Ockley, Butte lightweight, gained a decision over Pat O'Day, Portland after four fast rounds.
The house drew an even \$4000 gate.

R. H. S. QUINTET TO PLAY MARSHFIELD

Indians Given Chance for
Title Tie if Coquille
Also Makes Good.

Roseburg basketball fans are greatly interested in the game to be played Friday night at the Roseburg senior high school gymnasium between Roseburg and Marshfield. The game will be one of the most crucial of the series, as it will have a material effect upon a conference title. Roseburg's only hope to secure a tie for the championship rests upon defeating both Marshfield and Coquille, while it will also be necessary for Coquille to win from Marshfield in which case all three teams would be tied.
Marshfield has been undefeated so far this season, but all of its hard games have been played on the home floor. When the team went to Myrtle Point, Marshfield won 17 to 16 in an overtime period, which is the only game the league leaders have played away from home.
The fact that the Indians will be playing on their own floor, with the backing of sympathetic fans, will doubtless count greatly in their favor. Marshfield will also be away from home in the next game with Coquille, so that there is a good prospect for a three-way tie to result for the conference title. The most important hurdle, however, is in the Friday night game.

What Figures Show
Comparative scores would indicate that the Indians have a very good chance to beat Marshfield, if they are in form. Marshfield beat North Bend 23 to 12 at Marshfield, while Roseburg won from North Bend 18 to 11 at North Bend. Marshfield won at Myrtle Point 17 to 15, while Roseburg beat Myrtle Point 22 to 15 in the game here. Roseburg was beaten by Marshfield 19 to 15 in the game played at Marshfield.

Coquille, also counted upon to aid in dragging the clan diggers from their throe, beat North Bend at Coquille 33 to 15 and won at Myrtle Point 27 to 25. Coquille beat Roseburg here 26 to 15, but the Indians have a chance to overcome their slump of that game in a contest scheduled at Coquille on the 27th. While the Indians are under a handicap at this time, they still have an opportunity to pull out if they can maintain the pace which they are fully able to develop.

FREBERG LOSES ON CAVE-MAN FOULING

SPOKANE, WASH., Feb. 11.—Charlie Hansen, Seattle, lying flat on his back, was declared winner on a foul from John Freberg, Chicago, in the sixth round of their wrestling match here last night. Hansen weighed 198 and Freberg 232.

After winning the first fall by an airplane spin the fourth round, Freberg was well on his way to a second in the sixth. He rammed Hansen, head-on, sending the latter sprawling outside the ropes. Hansen apparently was in agony, and Referee Al Warsinski waved Freberg aside.
Instead, Freberg waited until Hansen was helped back into the ring, pushed Warsinski aside and pounced upon the prostrate man. He swung Hansen high over his head and threw him across the ring. Hansen did not move before the referee raised his hand in victory. His decision apparently pleased the crowd, who had booed Freberg lustily.

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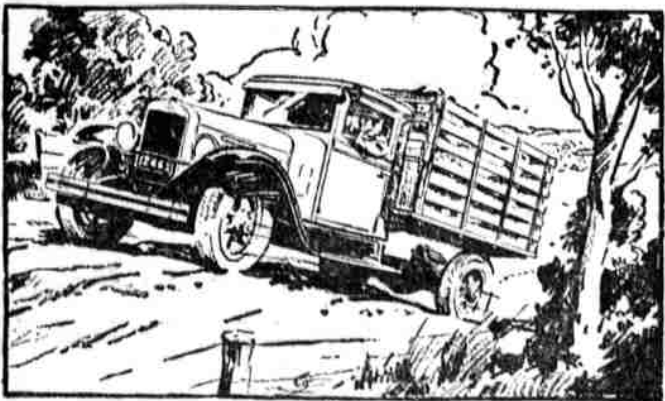
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
