STIRRING scenes of a rescue at sea, during a terrific tropical storm, furnish a few of the thrills in George Bancroft's new he-man drama, "Derelict," which the Indian theatre will show, starting today for two days.

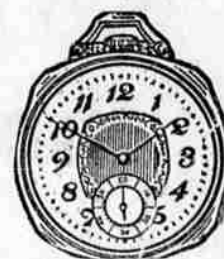

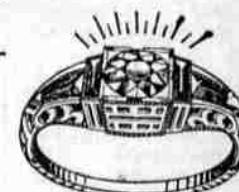
