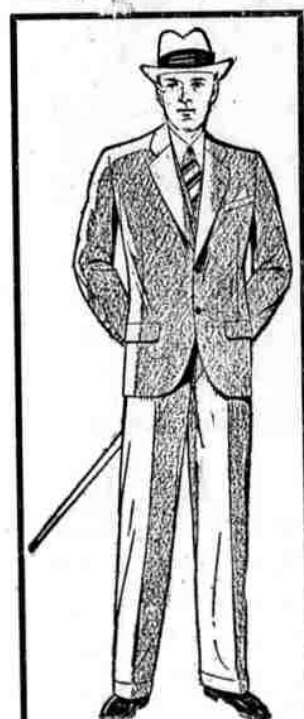

MRS. E. THOMPSON OF YONCALLA DIES

Mrs. Edith Brown Thompson, 71, well known resident of Yoncalla, passed away in the Pacific Christian hospital in Eugene, yesterday morning, after a short illness. She was born in St. Croix, Wis., Oct. 19, 1859, where she lived for a number of years. She moved to Iona, Minn., living there until 1895, and from there moved to Orling, Wash., where she lived for about three years. From there she came to Yoncalla, having made her home there for the last 35 years. She was married July 4, 1880, to Wallace Thompson, who passed away July 11, 1919. She is survived by one brother, Sumner Brown, Yoncalla. Mrs. Thompson was very active in community affairs and was a member of the Methodist Community church, also the Rebekah, Neighbors of Woodcraft and Eastern Star orders. The body was removed to Stearns' chapel and services will be held in the Community church of Yoncalla, Friday, at 2 p. m., with Rev. K. K. Clarke officiating. Interment will take place in the Yoncalla cemetery. Arrangements are in care of H. C. Stearns.
