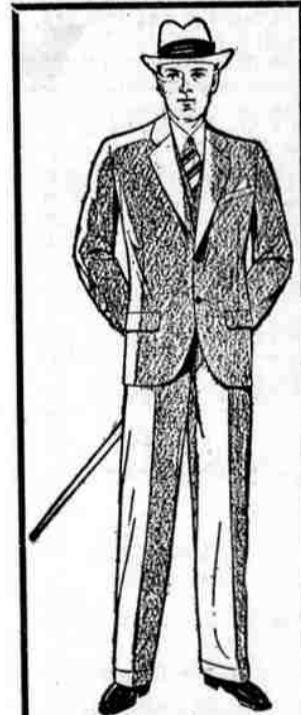

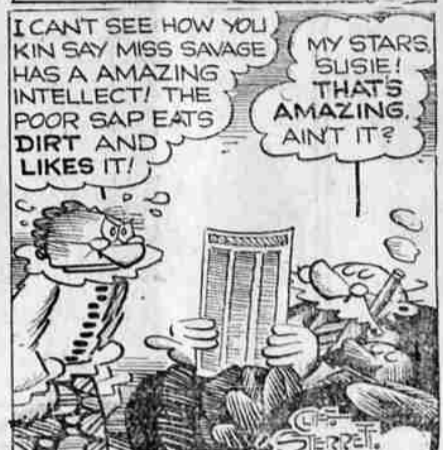

COURT TERM MAY SEE NO JURY TRIAL

Unless the grand jury reports criminal cases demanding a jury trial the jury for the February term of circuit court will not be called for next Monday, it was announced today. Only two civil actions were reported to be ready for trial, when the docket was called last Thursday, and since that time one of the cases, that of C. L. Ryley against the Texaco company, an action for money claimed to be due for labor, has been settled and dismissed. The principals in the other case, Lelia Maxwell against the Umpqua Consolidated Mines, have agreed to a trial before the judge without a jury. Those already called for jury service have been notified to appear next Monday. County Clerk Roy Agee is prepared to send out notices to the jurymen that their services will not be required this term unless some additional work is reported by the grand jury, which is expected to conclude its investigations tonight.

BROADCAST TO BOOST ROSEBURG BUSINESS

Roseburg business houses will be featured tonight in a program to be broadcast over the Oregon State college station, KOAC. The broadcast will be in the nature of a skit, "Paul and Polly in Roseburg." The skit presents a young married couple who visit the Roseburg mercantile establishments, and their observations will be given over the air. H. T.
