WILL ROGERS, international wit and philosopher, is one Hollywood star who has no taste for the public eye. He has never attended the premier presentation of one of his pictures. When such an event is about to take place Rogers invariably finds it convenient to be at some distant point or on the way to one in an airplane.

Rogers does attend previews of his pictures, but on such occasions manages to remain in hiding until the theatre lights are dimmed before he makes his entrance and gropes for the single seat that has been reserved for him.

When the picture is finished and the lights go up, he is missing, having made a quiet exit before the final fadeout. He is on his way home before the first of the audience reaches the street.

"Lightnin'," coming to the Indian theatre for three days starting today, was adapted from John Golden's tremendously successful stage play and was directed by Henry King. Rogers, in the leading role, is supported by a cast that includes such notables as Louise Dresser, famous for her mother roles, Helen Cohan, youthful and talented daughter of the distinguished George M. Cohan, Joel McCrea, popular leading juvenile, J. M. Kerrigan, outstanding character comedian and Sharon Lynn.

the capital city.

Representative McPhillips (discussing the "debtor" bill), "I tell you I am not in favor of passing a bill that will let a skunk skip into the next county and escape his just debts."

Rep. Angell: "I tell you, Representative McPhillips, I am not in favor of depriving a skunk of a scent (cent)."

The so-called "agricultural bill," which would place 15 or so commissions of the state under one administrative head, still reposes in the ways and means committee.

One week ago it was one of the most popular measures discussed about the legislature, both because it was purported to be an economical move as well as one which would add considerable efficiency to state government. Within the past few days a spasmodic opposition has arisen to this bill and many legislators are receiving discouraging reports from their constituents as to its advisability.

Just what the objections to the plan are does not seem quite clear.
