School districts of the second and third class should be permitted to run their own affairs in the opinion of a majority of members of the house of representatives who today by a vote of 32 to 25 defeated a bill that would limit the school boards of these districts to enter into contracts with teachers for periods longer than one year following the annual election of directors in the spring. The bill also sought to change the election date from June to March.

Prop on Silver Asked
A plea to congress that the federal government take steps to enter into an agreement with nations to restore the value of silver in foreign countries was introduced in the house today in the form of a joint memorial. The act would have the government confer with silver-using countries to maintain an international agreement the price of silver with its relation to gold. Medical Bill Goes Back

The bill would require a knowledge by druggists of five basic sciences and is sponsored by the medical profession. The house passed a joint memorial asking congress to appropriate federal money to the extent of about \$1,500,000 to match that already spent on the Mt. Adams interstate highway. The memorial has already passed the Washington legislature. The memorial now goes to the senate.

Representative C. H. Oxman believes that nobody wants to move into a county with a bad luck name. For the reason he has introduced a bill which would change the name of his county from Malheur to Sinnott and would make a like change in the name of Malheur river. Malheur means literally "bad hour" and, in freer translation, "bad luck." "That's no kind of a name to attract settlers," Oxman said.

The proposed new name would honor the late N. J. Sinnott, representative to congress from eastern Oregon.

Basketball Championship of
Northwest Regarded as
Good as Settled.

The Washington Huskies need only to win one of their four remaining games to clinch the northwest division championship of the Pacific coast conference series. The mathematical possibility of their losing seems so remote, plans are under way for holding the coast championship meet at Seattle next month with the Huskies facing either California or Southern California for the title. The two southern schools are in a tie and will wind up their regular schedule next Saturday.

The Huskies nosed out a 45 to 42 victory over the Washington State Cougars Friday night and pulled another out of the fire Saturday when Ned Nelson, sub forward, scored a field goal in the last two minutes of play to defeat the Cougars 24 to 23.

Oregon State won two games from Idaho, 37 to 24 and 47 to 40, and as a result is tied with Washington State for second place in the conference race.

Oregon and Oregon State renew their civil war at Eugene Saturday night. Preceding that the Webfoots tackle Idaho at Eugene in a two-game series tonight and tomorrow night, Washington State and Idaho meet at Pullman Saturday night.
