DOUGLAS B. & L. ENTERS LEAGUE

Qualifies for Membership in U. S. Organization of Over 1200 Members.

The Douglas Building and Loan association, Roseburg, Oregon, was admitted to membership last week in the U. S. Building and Loan league, according to H. F. Cellarius, of Cincinnati, Ohio. Mr. Cellarius is secretary-treasurer of the league.

In qualifying for membership the successful association submitted financial statements, by-laws and other details. The Douglas Building and Loan association becomes a member of a national organization in this field that has over 1200 members.

The league, organized 38 years ago to aid the work of the local associations in the home financing field, has on its rolls today some of the leaders in American finance. The Douglas Building and Loan association will be entitled to send a delegate to the conventions and to participate in the national program for tax relief, home owning encouragement and other work undertaken by the league.

According to B. L. Eddy, president of the Douglas Building and Loan association, the assets were \$323,039.53 at the time of the last annual report of the association, made January 31, 1931. 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PROPOSED CHANGE IN ROAD VIEWED

County Commissioners R. A. Busenbark and C. E. Lonsdon, accompanied by Floyd Fear, county engineer, and Oscar Cutler, assistant state market road engineer, left this afternoon for Glide, where they will inspect the sites of the present road and the proposed location, to which Glide residents are objecting. The county will be required within the next few months to provide a new bridge over Little river, and it is desired to place the bridge on a line with the road as it will be finally established.

The state road and bridge engineers have insisted that the new location be adopted to give a straight road from the bridge to Lone Rock, while the residents of Glide are vigorously protesting the change as it would leave the school, store and church buildings, together with most of the residences off the highway.

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
