Portland Symphony Orchestra Will Be Heard in Eugene February 22

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 17.—(Special)—Of interest to all towns within a hundred mile radius of Eugene is the concert that the Portland Symphony orchestra is to give in the university city on the afternoon of Sunday, February 22.

The concert, which is to be sponsored by the Associated Students of the University of Oregon, will be held in McArthur court, near the campus, beginning at 3 o'clock.

The Portland orchestra has been brought to Eugene by its noted conductor Willem van Hoogstraten, three times in the last five years; but this year's concert will be the first to be given in the afternoon. The change from the usual evening hour was made to allow music lovers from other towns to attend without having to return home late in the evening.

SILVER INQUIRY PUT UP TO HOOVER

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—A resolution requesting President Hoover to enter negotiations with other governments looking toward suspension of their policies of devaluing silver coins and selling silver on the world market was approved today by the senate finance committee.

Strides of Aviation

GLUE TO MISSING CHILD REPORTED

Virginia Brooks Traveling With Man in Arizona, Officers Informed.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Feb. 18.—Results from what was believed to be the first real clue to the whereabouts of little Virginia Brooks, ten-year-old school girl who dropped from sight a week ago today on her way from her home to school here, were expected at an hour early today by the sheriff's office. New hope in the search was lent by a message sent from Arizona late yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Blake Mason, who had been sent from San Diego, that a girl answering the description of Virginia Brooks had been seen at Tacna, near Wellton, Ariz., Saturday and Sunday and that she had been with a man of about 50 years, who was supposed to be or posed as her father.

Mason went to Phoenix in pursuit of the small automobile in which the man and girl were traveling, but did not find them there last night so far as the sheriff's office here knew. The pair left Tacna Monday.

Sheriff Cooper, from his office here, sent telegrams all over the southwest last night and early today in an effort to head off the pair, who were supposed to be headed for Kansas according to information sent from Phoenix here.

The man and girl were held up two days at Tacna by flooded highways.

MUSCLE SHOALS ACCORD REACHED

Government Will Operate Plants But Lease Area for Fertilizer.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—The ten-year old deadlock between house and senate over Muscle Shoals legislation was definitely broken today.

The senate conferees and a majority of the house managers signed a compromise agreement for operation of the government's \$150,000,000 power and nitrate plant and the report will be submitted to the house tomorrow.

The agreement provides for government operation of the power plant, lease of the nitrate plants for production of fertilizer and by-products if possible, and government construction of power transmission lines for distribution of electricity from Wilson dam.

The compromise provides that the lessee of the nitrate plant can obtain 15 per cent of the amount of power used in production of fertilizer for manufacture of electro-chemical products off the government reservation and as much secondary power as the president decides is fair and equitable.

The conferees retained the provision of the original senate bill for construction by the government of the Cove creek dam on the Clinch river.

Under the compromise the president will have one year after enactment of the bill in which to negotiate a lease for the nitrate plants.

If he fails to obtain a lease within that time the government will operate the plant for experimental production of fertilizer.

PROF. IRVING GLEN DIES IN CALIFORNIA

SEATTLE, Feb. 18.—Word was received here today of the death of Irving Glen, 60, dean of the college of fine arts of the University of Washington, in Santa Barbara, California, where he had gone several months ago in an effort to regain his health. Mrs. Glen was with him when he died.

Dean Glen, born in Brooklyn, N. Y., was widely known as a musical director and lecturer, but he was primarily a voice instructor. His daughter, Juliet, is now living with and studying singing under Madame Emma Calve at Nice, France.

During 1907-7 he was professor of English and Latin at McMinville College, Oregon. From 1897 until 1911 he was a member of the University of Oregon faculty as professor of English and literature and dean of the school of music. He then came to the University of Washington, where he became director of the arts in 1912 and dean of the college of fine arts in 1915.

He was graduated from the state normal school in California, the California School of Eloquence and Oratory, the Elwood School of Music at San Jose, the University



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
