FUGITIVE YOUTHS APPREHENDED HERE

Ray Stoutenburg, George Slagle and Virgil Tracey, escapes from the Oregon State Training school, were captured here Saturday night and were taken back to Salem by E. L. Ferguson, one of the officials of the institution. Sheriff Jackson located the three boys late Saturday afternoon. While going out to arrest them he saw Mr. Ferguson, who was driving through from Medford to Salem with a boy committed to the school. He halted the official and together they arrested the three escapes, who were hiding in the "jungle" south of town.

The three boys escaped Wednesday night while playing as members of the basketball team at the state deaf school. They had been without food since the time of their escape when they were picked up here Saturday. Slagle was suffering from a badly infected hand, which resulted from a fall on glass, while Stoutenburg had a wrenched leg. The boys had decided to remain at Roseburg to procure food and obtain needed rest, but were apprehended by Sheriff Jackson as they were going into hiding.
