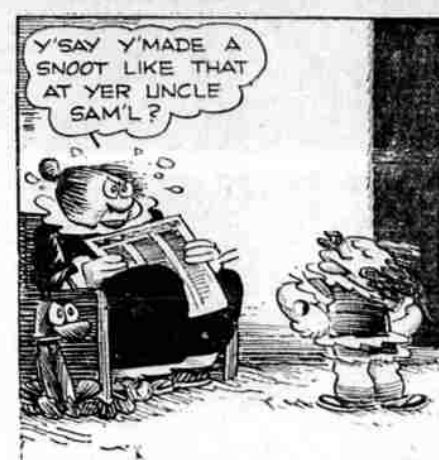

War on Gypsy Moths Has Run Into Millions

Ravages in Eastern States Laid to Escape of Caterpillars Sixty-Two Years Ago.

ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 24.—When few fuzzy little caterpillars escaped from a scientist at Medford, Mass., 62 years ago they started on a march of devastation that has cost New England states \$100,000,000.

A relentless war is now being waged in the Hudson and Champlain valleys to prevent the ravagers from invading the rest of the country.

The New York conservation department, in announcing the enormous loss suffered by New England in devastated forest, fruit and shade trees, warned that a new infestation of gypsy moths, which grow from the little caterpillars, has just been discovered in the town of Milan, Dutchess county, a few miles west of the Connecticut state line. A barrier zone has been set up to block the pest's advance.

With department scouts and exterminators on constant vigilance, this year Gov. Franklin D. Roosevelt recommended that the annual appropriation for the insect war be doubled, so as to serve the dual purpose of strengthening the state's forces against the ever-increasing horde and to provide extra jobs for unemployed, and it is being done.

This year will be \$5,000,000. Commissioner Henry Morgenthau Jr. has asked federal authorities for increased assistance in cleaning up the heavily infested area in New England. It is hoped the federal appropriation also will be doubled.

GUARD DRILLS IN VARIOUS COURSES

Plans Progress for Public Exhibition—Yoncalla Will Be Visited.

CHRISTMAS SEAL SALES DECREASED

The receipts from the sale of Christmas Seals in Douglas county in 1930 are \$200 less than the receipts from last year's sale. Mrs. H. C. Boyle, chairman of the county's sale, announced today.

This decrease, in spite of the great work accomplished with revenues from last year's sale, the establishment of the dental clinic in which the county's poor may receive dental treatments at cost, and in view of the increased need for money at the present, is very discouraging.

Over one hundred and fifty people in Roseburg have failed to respond to the Christmas seals which were sent to them in December, either by remitting the one dollar or by returning the seals.

As a result of this oversight, and I am sure it is just an oversight on the part of those people who have failed to remit for the seals sent them, and in order to make my final checking before the annual conference of the Oregon Tuberculosis association in Portland, March 10th and 11th, I am mailing reminders to those people. This is not a new appeal for money, but a request for response which I am sure will be forthcoming," declared Mrs. Boyle.

Farm-to-City Movement Shows Decrease

Population of Rural Districts Registers Gain for First Time in Ten Years.

Fewer people are leaving the farms. More people are moving to farms. The net result, adding the surplus of births over deaths on farms, is that the farm population has increased for the first time in ten years.

The number of persons who left farms for towns and cities in 1930 was 1,542,000 compared with 1,876,000 persons in 1929, and a peak movement of 2,155,000 persons in 1926, according to estimates by the bureau of agricultural economics, U. S. department of agriculture.

The movement from cities to farms in 1930 was the largest since 1924. Last year, 1,392,000 persons moved from cities to farms, compared with a peak movement of 1,396,000 persons in 1924. The trek farmward is considered a reflection of the industrial employment situation.

The net movement away from farms was 151,000 persons last year, but a normal increase of 359,000 births over deaths on farms last year brought the total farm population on January 1, 1931, to 27,430,000 persons as compared with 27,222,000 persons on January 1, 1930.
