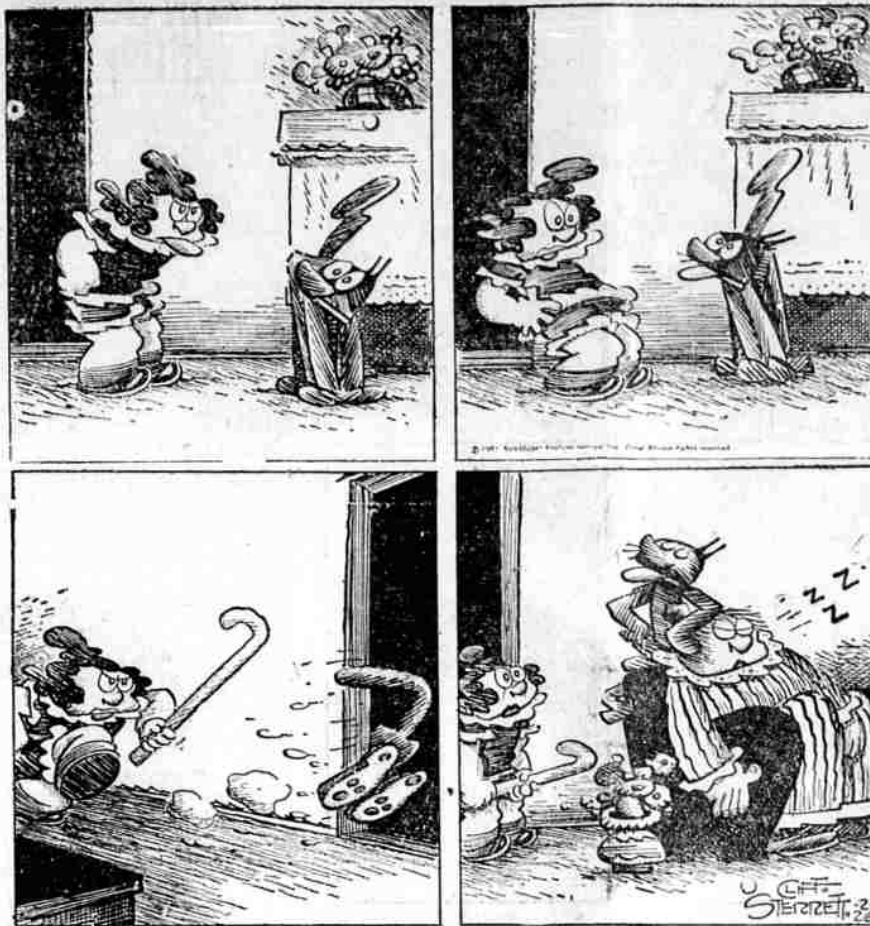

PROHIBITION HITS AT FRUIT JUICES

Senator Sheppard Aims to Tighten Volstead Law; Wet Moves Fast.

(Associated Press Licensed Wire)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—Legislation to put manufacturers of concentrated fruit juices under restrictions of the Volstead prohibition act was introduced today by Senator Sheppard, democrat, Texas.

He offered an amendment striking out the sentence in the Volstead act under which the manufacturers of the grape concentrates and fruit juices claimed authority for their product.

That sentence reads:

"The penalties provided in this act against the manufacture of liquor without a permit shall not apply to a person for manufacturing non-intoxicating cider and fruit juices exclusively for use in his home, but such cider and fruit juices shall not be sold or delivered except to persons having permits to manufacture vinegar."

TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION PREFERS PROHIBITION

DETROIT, Feb. 25.—Tabling a resolution that would have urged repeal of the eighteenth amendment, the resolutions committee of the department of superintendence of the National Education association today reaffirmed its belief in the amendment.

The committee's resolution reads:

"We reaffirm our belief in the eighteenth amendment as the most effective means yet devised to curtail the distribution and use of alcohol. We call upon the teachers to cultivate, both by their personal attitudes and their direct teachings, a respect for this law as well as for all other laws of our country."

AL CAPONE FACES COURT IN CHICAGO

Notorious Gang Leader Is Charged With Contempt; Mood Is Jovial.

CHICAGO, Feb. 25.—"Scarface" Al Capone went on trial today for contempt of federal court. He returned from his Miami home to face the charge and pleaded not guilty.

Appearance of the notorious gang leader caused such a future that the federal building resembled a besieged fortress. A cordon of mounted policemen was thrown about the building. Thousands of persons lined the streets and news reel camera trucks and other photographers guarded every entrance. The few persons allowed to enter court were searched for weapons.

The case involves the gangster's appearance as a witness before a federal grand jury in 1929. He was in Florida at the time, and asked his appearance be continued on the grounds that he was convalescing from a serious illness and the trip north would endanger his health.
