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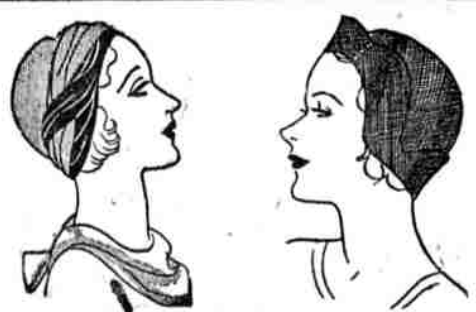
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Vacationing in California—Mr. and Mrs. L. G. Maddox, of Medford, are spending a few weeks vacationing in California.

conferred on the entire tax situation with the governor, and a vote was taken on the separate items after nearly three hours of discussion.

Outline of Program.
The program recommended, with the support of the entire taxation group and endorsed by the governor is as follows:

1. That an eight per cent tax on incomes from intangibles be levied for the year 1930 and subsequent years. This bill has already passed the house.

2. That no special election be called by the legislature, but should referendum be invoked, provision be made by amendment to this bill providing for such election to be held about June 30, and upon which ballot no other matters will appear.

3. That the 1929 intangibles tax case be appealed to the United States supreme court. The tax was declared unconstitutional by the state supreme court.

4. That provision be specifically made that return of the \$900,000 collected under this law be made to the taxpayers in the event the supreme court upholds the decision of the Oregon court, with interest at 6 per cent from the date of the Oregon court decision.

5. That in the event the 1929 tax is declared constitutional, the remainder of the taxes due under this law be collected.

6. That the excise tax on corporations be raised from five to eight per cent. A bill with this stipulation has already passed the house.

7. That a constitutional amendment be submitted to the people at



the 1932 general election providing the base for the six per cent tax limitation be the highest rate for any three preceding years. A resolution to this effect has been introduced.

The conference was called to effect a tax program before the Oregon legislature adjourns, and one which will relieve the burden of real property owners.

Refund Now Sought.
A substitute bill or an amendment to the refund tax bill now before the house of representatives will be proposed today. The bill now provides for an immediate cash refund of the 1929 intangibles tax while the tax program provides for the refund if the state court's decision is upheld. This refund would then be made plus the interest.

Governor Meier expressed the view that if the referendum on the intangibles be invoked the people would vote for the measure, since there were several hundred thousand people demanding relief of real property taxation. This relief can only be effected through the taxes as provided by the program, he stated.

ANOTHER SALARY BILL FEELS GOVERNOR'S AXE
SALEM, Feb. 26.—Governor Meier swung the veto axe again late yesterday and returned to the capitol with a message expressing his disapproval of a bill increasing the salary of the assessor of Umatilla county from \$1500 to \$1800 a year.

As justification for his veto the governor reiterated his declaration that the present is no time for salary increases, and his opinion that a public official in accepting an office contracts to accept its duties at the prevailing salary.

Power Bill Now Law.
Without the signature of the governor, senate bill 67, relating to power development and closely connected with the power program, yesterday became a law. The bill provides for exemption of municipalities from making formal application to the federal water power commission within six months after preliminary filing for water power sites had been made with the state. The hydro-electric commission bill and the grange utility district measures are before the governor for his signature.

With the passage of the utility commission bill, which is expected in the senate, and which has the emergency clause attached to it, the act will become effective upon the signature of Governor Julius L. Meier. The act carries with it the abolishment of the present public service commission of three members. The present members of the commission are Hal D. Patton, Salem; H. H. Corey, Baker, and O. C. Bortzmeyer, Portland.

By the provisions of the act the governor will appoint one man as commissioner of public utilities, and the names of several possible candidates for this office have been generally mentioned. Among those suggested as possible choice of the executive for the office have been L. A. Liljeqvist, Marshfield, attorney and active in drafting power program legislation; Harry L. Gross, Portland attorney; Colonel A. E. Clark, Portland; Kenneth Harlan, utility rate expert, and Rufus C. Holman. The governor has not indicated his possible choice, nor that he has decided upon the candidate, should the legislation be finally enacted. The position carries a salary of \$7500 annually.

The senate adopted Senator Jay H. Upton's joint memorial calling upon congress to enact legislation to protect the people of Langell valley against drought.

After an extended debate the senate voted down an adverse report on house bill 215 creating an apartment house landlord's lien on personal property of tenants. The bill passed the house with one dissenting vote.

SENATE REFUSES TO DROP MALHEUR AS COUNTY NAME
SALEM, Ore., Feb. 26.—(A. P.)—The name of Malheur county will remain as it is, the senate decided by indefinitely postponing the house bill which would change the name to "Sinnott" county in honor of the late Nicholas J. Sinnott. The ten per cent salary reduction bill was also defeated in the senate.

The senate committee on agriculture took interest in the tax situation by introducing in the senate a joint resolution which, in effect, is the Mott resolution that was voted down in the house, calling for a constitutional amendment prohibiting the levy of any ad valorem tax for state purposes on real or tangible property.

A bill appropriating \$50,000 to put into effect the administration hydro-electric and power conservation measure and a measure removing the governor, the secretary of state and the state treasurer from
