

BOMB PLOT LAID TO CUBAN SOLDIERS

Personal Aide and Five of
Guard Arrested After
Attack on Machado.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

HAVANA, Feb. 28.—Court martial and possibly serious penalties were believed today to face Commander Manuel Espinosa, aide-de-camp of President Machado, and five members of the presidential guard who have been arrested under suspicion of implication in the attempt against the life of the president last Monday morning.

Espinosa was involved in the investigation by a soldier who standing patrol duty on top of the presidential mansion, lowered a bomb into a ventilating aperture and lit its fuse at about the time the president was taking his bath. The bomb lodged in the vent at the floor above and exploded there, doing considerable damage to the bathroom and fixtures.

The soldier is said to have told police that Espinosa, who is a brother of a Cuban judge and of a congressman, had offered him \$5,000 if he would plant the bomb.

Police said today that a former Havana mayor and a number of other prominent citizens might be involved.

Espinosa is the brother-in-law of Manuel Mariano Gomez, who was mayor of Havana until last Tuesday and was regarded as an opponent of the Machado administration.

Police early today broke up a labor meeting and arrested 16 persons, including a number of women, who were charged with communist activity.

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INDIANS LOSE TO COQUILLE, 19 TO 17

Victory, Won in Last Two
Minutes, Ties Two Coos
Teams for Title.

The Roseburg senior high school Indians were beaten 19 to 17 in a whirlwind game of basketball at Coquille last night, losing the game in the last few minutes of play when the Coquille team in a frantic rally to save its chance for a tie in the conference championship opened up a last-minute, long range attack that scratched out a two-point victory.

Roseburg took the lead in the first quarter 8 to 3, and was ahead 11 to 6 at the half. Coquille gained ground in the third quarter which ended 15 to 12. A defeat for Coquille would have given Marshfield an undisputed championship of the conference, and the players and fans were frantic as the game entered the last few minutes with the Indians still leading and playing a beautiful defensive game.

Lucky Shot Wins—Unable to penetrate the Roseburg defense at close quarters, Coquille broke in with long shots, and succeeded in tying the score with only two minutes left to play. The last two minutes saw one of the most exciting contests of the whole conference, but a lucky shot from mid-center gave Coquille a 19 to 17 victory. Marshfield and Coquille are now tied for leadership in the Coos-Douglas-Curry conference.

Roseburg is playing at Myrtle Point tonight. The Indians have only one more conference game after tonight, playing North Bend at Roseburg March 6.

In-And-Outers—The local team will make a determined effort to win the tournament at Marshfield, where the team will be selected to represent the district at the state tournament in Salem. The Indians have demonstrated their ability to battle any of the teams of the conference if they hit their best pace, but so far have not been consistent, playing beautiful ball in one game and then showing much ragged play in the next.

U. OF O. QUINTET DEFEATS STATERS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 28.—Oregon university's fighting basketball quintet came from behind to stage a last half rally to defeat their bitter rivals, Oregon State, 29 to 22 here last night and definitely placed Oregon State in third place in the northern division of the Pacific coast conference. They will retain this position regardless of the outcome of the final game at Eugene tonight.

It was Oregon's second victory in three games with the Staters. The Orangemen led 12 to 7 at the half, but after that period were unable to hit the basket consistently and their passing was ragged.

Dolph and Eberhart starred for the Webfoots while Ken Fagan was the Staters' best bet.

Billy Townsend K. O.'s Reister

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Feb. 28.—The record of Billy Townsend, Vancouver, B. C., welterweight, stood at two wins and no defeats today for his most recent invasion here.

He knocked out Bobby Reister of Alhambra in the sixth round of their ten round main event last night. In his previous bout he won a decision over Tod Morgan, former junior lightweight champion.

Townsend led the fighting last night and won every round except the fifth, which was a draw.

Reister went down for a ninth count in the sixth, got to his feet but toppled over again without being hit. Both battlers weighed 142 pounds.

Huskies Defeat Idaho Hoopsters

An invasion of American territory is now in full swing — now, don't get excited, for it's not of a military nature. No, hardly, for the particular participants are a group of the foremost women golfers in England.

Among the feminine stars is Diana Fishwick, who last summer won the championship of England by repulsing the challenge of Glenna Collett in the final round. The American girl had appeared to finally be on the road to victory after several years of disappointments, but Miss Fishwick, then comparatively an unknown, proved more than equal to her big job.

Now, accompanied by such players as Kathleen Garham, Jessie Firth, and Marjorie White, the women's golf champion of England has come to America in an effort to repeat her successes.

At Palm Beach last week, the English delegation was turned back by a group of American stars Helen Hicks finally winning the title. And, now, again, in the south Atlantic tournament, the foreign links experts have trod a rough path.

Yesterday, Miss Fishwick suffered her second defeat on U. S. soil, losing this time to a member of her own party, Kathleen Garham of London. And in the same round Helen Hicks fell before Martha Parkers, Spring Lake, N. Y., who had never before proven a contender. So, Miss Parkers will carry the colors of this country today in the final round which will now have a distinctly international flavor.
