TODAY'S MARKETS

Wool Market Dull
HOSIERY, Feb. 28.—The Commercial Bulletin said today: "With the holiday and the Lawrence strike going on this week, in addition to the natural let-down in trading, consequent upon the sizeable movement in wool which has occurred since the first of the year, the market at the seaboard has been dull this week for the most part. Prices, except for medium wools, which are a bit easier, have been steady to firm."

"In the west there has been little action, although some small consignments are reported."

"The foreign markets are continuing very firm and if anything, the buyer with steady clearances in the markets of the southern hemisphere."

"With the Lawrence strike settled Thursday, the outlook is clarified very noticeably, although the manufacturers could do more business."

"Mohair is slow and not quotably changed. No confirmation is available here of the announcement from Texas that 20 cents for adult and 30 cents for kid will be the basis of advance by the cooperatives on the new clip mohair, compared with 25 and 45 cents a year ago."

Annual Father and Son Banquet of Agricultural Student Enjoyed Friday

The annual Father and Son banquet of the Agricultural students of the Roseburg high schools was held in the school dining room on Friday evening. The affair took the form of a celebration of the signing of the charter conferred upon the members of the High School Ag club by the Future Farmers of America, a national organization of high school students of agriculture.

The long tables were decorated with large baskets of sweet peas and ferns. The food was furnished by the boys of the agriculture classes, and prepared and served by the girls of the home economics class, supervised by Miss Ellen Matson. Guests were the members of the F. F. A., their fathers, members of the school board, Sam W. M. Campbell, Scottmaster E. A. Britton, Mr. Clyde Beard, principal of the junior high, Mr. Fred Goff, state officer of the grange, Mr. R. R. Cooley, state supervisor of Smith-Hughes agriculture, and Mr. H. W. Grow, agriculture instructor, and advisor of the F. F. A.

After the banquet, speeches were made by Mr. J. R. Wharton, Dr. B. R. Shoemaker, Mr. Britton, Mr. Beard, Mr. Goff, Mr. Campbell, Mr. Cooley and Mr. Grow. John Bursik, one of the students, acted as toastmaster. The guests were then taken on in the farm shop where there were on display, examples of soldering, rope work, rather cutting, milk testing, leather work and uses of the electric needle. In the classroom a demonstration was made of the testing of soil for acidity.

A program of sports was given in the gymnasium, consisting of a basketball game between the members of the crops and mechanics classes, wrestling matches between the Sandquist brothers, and boxing matches between Bennie Daniels and Henry Handy. At a late hour the meeting was adjourned, with the feeling of enthusiasm among both the boys and parents, and much additional interest in the plans for work to be done in the coming months.

Panama's New President Veteran Diplomat, Jurist and Educator

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—A quiet, dignified, studious man, just past his 48th birthday, has been called from his country's most important diplomatic post to become president of Panama.

Dr. Ricardo J. Alfaro, who left Washington to head the new government "in the land of the canal," has been a familiar and distinguished figure in the official and social life of Washington for the last eight years.

As his country's minister to the United States since August 28, 1922, he has made the gray stone mansion on New Hampshire avenue—in the heart of the capital's diplomatic sector—an outstanding seat of Latin-American diplomacy in Washington.

Socially, too, the Panama legation under Dr. Alfaro's administration has played a prominent part in the whirl of the capital. His custom of entertaining small groups at receptions attracted to the legation the socially-elitist of Washington.

Of medium height, erect as a soldier, his graying black hair cut close, Dr. Alfaro was conceded one of the most learned and hardest-working men in the corps.

Famous as an international jurist, well known as an author and

experienced as a professor, he has had a distinguished career since he entered the service of his country as assistant secretary of foreign affairs at the age of 23.

Educated at Babson college in Panama and at the University of Cartagena in Colombia, he holds the degree of doctor of laws on the national faculty of law in Panama.

For seven years he was professor of history at the Panama National institute, and for five years professor of civil law at the Panama National school of law.

France, Spain, Peru, Venezuela and Italy have awarded him official decorations in recognition of services.

From 1918 to 1922 he was premier of the cabinet of Panama. Before that he made an enviable record in international judicial work. During his eight years as minister at Washington he represented Panama as a delegate to the Pan-American congresses at Havana and Washington.

He is the author of the judicial code of Panama (1916), and a treatise on the advisability of adapting the trust law to legislation of Latin countries which was awarded the gold medal by the National Institute of Panama in 1919.
