

BANDIT POSES AS RICH FAMILY SCION

Edward Dillon, Former Convict, Nabbed After Flier in Society.

(Associated Press Local Wire)
CHICAGO, March 2.—A strange coincidence put dapper Edward "Tody" Dillon of St. Louis, once the slaying of his physician-father, into the hands of Chicago police yesterday as a hotel holdup. He was identified, the police said, by five victims.

Clad in a gray suit and spats and with a carnation in his button hole, the 24-year-old St. Louisan, accompanied by a prominently young woman, attended a theater in the loop Saturday night. So did Albert Baker, who lost ninety cents recently in a holdup at the DeWitt hotel. They strolled into the lobby between acts. Baker saw him, called the manager and the police were summoned. Two sergeants later took Dillon from a front row seat.

The girl, whose name was withheld by police, was agitated. She met Dillon at a Northwestern university dance and easily convinced police that she knew nothing of his activities. She said he told her that he was the son of a wealthy family and made frequent airplane trips to the east.

Has Prison Record.
Dillon admitted that within the past five years he had served terms in Sing Sing prison and the Elmira, N. Y., reformatory. Six years ago he was arrested in connection with the investigation into the death of his father, Dr. William A. Dillon, who was found shot to death on the campus of Washington university, St. Louis. He was the beneficiary of the doctor's insurance policy, but was subsequently freed.

Crook at University.
Police here say Dillon established his reputation both socially and criminally before he was 25 years old. In 1924 he entered the University of Kansas at Lawrence, Kan. He was noted there, police say, as the flaming youth of the campus—sending, at one time, 24 dozen roses to a sorority house to one-cod be admired.

He remained as a student, police say, until March of 1925 when he was dropped by the university on a charge that he forged his entrance credits.

WASHINGTON, March 2.—Quietly and unobtrusively, in the latter days of this congress a dapper, well-groomed senator from the Pacific coast has been making a name for himself on the hill.

He is Charles McNary of Oregon, assistant to Jim Watson of Indiana, the republican floor leader of the senate. Those wishing to get the "inside" on questions of importance in the senate long have been in the habit of talking it over with McNary. All know that he keeps his ear about as close to the ground as any of his colleagues; that very little goes on around the capitol with which he is not familiar.

Since last December, it has become apparent that Watson has turned over much of the leadership work to him. He has handled the details for the big Hoover leader more and more as the days passed. There are some who will tell you that it was McNary who finally brought peace in the drought relief controversy.

Regarded Fair, Reasonable
His temperament is the sort required for one in such a position. The senators like him and respect his ability. His voice is soft, though when he desires his words can hit home with telling effect. But at such times he leaves no hard feelings in their wake.

THOMAS TO RETAIN UTILITIES STAFF

(Associated Press Local Wire)

SALEM, March 2.—No immediate changes will be made in the staff of the public service commission, Charles M. Thomas announced today upon assuming his office as commissioner of utilities. Other than the automatic removal of the three members of the old commission, Hal D. Patton, O. C. Brozmeier and H. H. Corey, the same force will be employed for the present, Thomas said.

In his statement upon taking office Thomas said, in part:

"An important provision of the constructive utilities legislation is the so-called 'home-rule provision' which vests in cities and towns of the state the power, to be exercised at their option, of contracting for or prescribing the service, facilities and products to be furnished by public utilities and the rates, charges and tolls that may be collected therefor. Adequate safeguards are thrown around this power and until it is exercised, the power of regulation remains vested in the commission of public utilities."

"The legislation also repeals the so-called certificate of convenience and necessity act under which all competition in the public utility field in the past has been prevented."

"With all this legislation I am heartily in accord and will, to the best of my ability, execute it in the interest and for the benefit of the people, and at the same time administer justice to the public utility corporations of the state."
