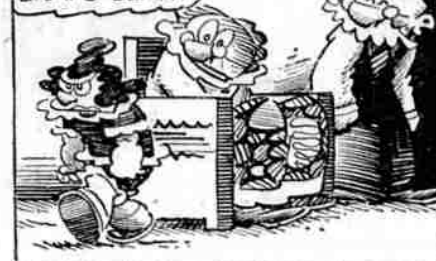

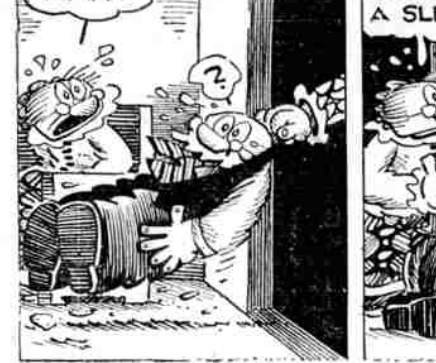

R. H. S. HAS CHANCE FOR THIRD PLACE

Indian Quintet Must Defeat North Bend Friday to Cinch Standing.

Roseburg's chances in the district basketball tournament at Marshfield next week depend in a very large measure upon the results of the game Friday night with North Bend. Coach Hod Turner reports that if Roseburg wins the game, which is to be played at the senior high school gymnasium, the Indians will take third place in the conference. In the event of a loss Roseburg, North Bend and Myrtle Point will be in a triple tie. If the Indians can take third place, they will have a much easier tournament schedule than if they drop into fourth, fifth, or sixth place, which would probably result from a drawing between the three teams making up the tie. If Roseburg is third in the conference, it will draw Coos River, a "B" league team as its first opponent at 7:30 o'clock Thursday, March 12, the opening day of the conference. It will then enter the semi-final at 8:30 p. m. on Friday. If successful in beating Coos River, and if able to win there will play in the finals at 8:30 p. m. Saturday, giving a maximum amount of rest obtain-

able in such a tournament. In the event, however, that Roseburg loses to North Bend, and draws one of the lower positions, the Indians will be matched against a much stronger team in the first game, as they will have to play one of the conference leaders in the opening contest. In addition to the Roseburg-North Bend game Friday night, Spencer's, winners of the Roseburg city league championship, will play a return match with the Myrtle Point town team.
