PARIS—Parisians are shaking somewhat of a revolt against black—their favorite color for many a year.

It is quite a discreet revolt to be sure, but it waxes a determined flag of colors through a fashion world that was one of the blackest Paris ever saw.

The smart set, garbed in black from head to toe, has been tired of the all-black costume for weeks and now it knew what to do about it.

Now it finds the answer in light satin tunics, bright crepe fabric, ray scarves and hats and colored jewel necklaces, and the women who would be smart is adding those to her wardrobe.

The color of her eyes plays an important part in her choice.

Her all-black coat the blue-eyed Parisienne is wearing to top a frock of turquoise blue crepe or a seven-eighths satin tunic of peacock with a close-fitting little chapeau to match.

The brown-eyed girl chooses a frock with a tale rose bodice (crusted on a black skirt, coral earrings and bracelets); while the blond whose eyes have a greenish tint wears emerald or jade pins, clips and earrings.

The combinations of black and white or black and one or two colors are legion. One of the smartest women adds a strip of coral velvet to her black bodice, while another adds a bright blue feather to the hat she wears with sapphire earrings.
