

CLINICS HELD ON EVERY SATURDAY

Diphtheria and Smallpox
Immunization Provided
by Health Unit.

In order to meet the numerous requests for smallpox vaccinations, Dr. H. H. Shoemaker, county health officer, today announced that this season will be given to those desiring it during the immunization clinic every Saturday morning at ten o'clock in the health unit office in the court house, Roseburg.

Smallpox vaccinations will be given with the third injection of the toxin-antitoxin series if it is accepted, or separately. As is done with the diphtheria immunization, a charge covering only the cost of the serum will be made. The charge for smallpox vaccination is fifteen cents and for the complete series of diphtheria immunization it is thirty cents.

The toxin-antitoxin clinic, according to Dr. Shoemaker, is a very popular one, the attendance so far averaging twenty.

In order to more fully explain the process of immunization against diphtheria and to clear up any misunderstandings about the toxin-antitoxin, Dr. Shoemaker has prepared the following facts about it:

"Age: Toxin-antitoxin is given to well children from six months upwards for protection against diphtheria.

"Method: Toxin-antitoxin is given by hypodermic injection in three doses a week apart. It does not interfere in any way with regular duties.

"Effect: Toxin-antitoxin has been used in thousands of cases without ill effect. Occasionally the arm gets a little sore.

"After the last injection it takes about six months for the immunity to fully develop. The immunity probably lasts through childhood, the dangerous age. Sometimes, as in vaccination, it is necessary to give toxin-antitoxin the second time.

"Schick test: Since no scar is left by the injection, it is advisable six months later to test the child to see whether or not the immunity is fully developed. This is called the Schick test.

"It is very important that young children who do not go to school should receive this protection, since at least 90 per cent of the fatal cases of diphtheria occur in young children, under six years of age."

MRS. THORNEWILL FREED OF MURDER

SANTA CRUZ, Cal., March 7.—Mrs. Helene Grant Thornevill, at tractive 32-year-old Santa Cruz society woman, was acquitted yesterday by a jury of men of charges of murdering her husband, Leslie A. Thornevill, former Canadian mounted policeman.

The jurors deliberated only 20 minutes.

When the verdict was read Mrs. Thornevill threw her arms about her chief counsel, Edward Canlin, of San Francisco, and kissed him. The trial began February 16.

Thornevill was fatally shot December 29 when his wife attempted to bring him home from a party at a cabin on the Los Gatos highway near Santa Cruz, where he had gone with another woman.

Three shots were fired in the struggle for possession of the pistol after Thornevill refused to accompany his wife home. Two entered his body, resulting in his death January 8.

\$50,000 SUIT ECHOES MAH JONGG GAME

SAN FRANCISCO, March 7.—Bridge games have been known to lead to divorces, baseball games have ended in free-for-all fights, but now for possibly the first time on record a mah jongg game has resulted in the filing of a \$50,000 damage suit.

W. W. Adams is being sued for \$50,000 actual and punitive damages by a fellow broker, Kenneth Watson, who charges that in a flat battle over a disputed point during an after lunch mah jongg game, Adams struck him on the head, permanently injuring him.

Adams admitted the quarrel but denies the flat fight.

417,064 ACRES ADDED
TO FOREST RESERVE

WASHINGTON, March 7.—For est lands totalling 417,064 acres were acquired last year by the United States.

Areas in 15 states were included, and eventually will be proclaimed as national forests, to be added to the 149 existing national forests.

Objectives stressed include watershed protection, fire control, demonstration of timber-crowling methods and development of other public forest values.

HIGHWAY BOARD CHANGE RUMORED

Gates to Be Succeeded by
William Hanley, Gossip
Heard at Salem.

SALEM, March 6.—Appearance in the lobby early Friday afternoon in company with Governor Meier of William "Bill" Hanley, the "Sage of Burns," gave rise to so small amount of speculation among those who are watching the reorganization process by which the executive is expected to put his promised business administration of state affairs into operation.

Hanley, long a close friend of the late George Joseph and a staunch supporter of Governor Meier for election, has been generally expected to fill an important berth in the new administration, being most widely credited with prospects of landing on the state highway commission as a representative of eastern Oregon, chiefly because of his past identification with the good roads movement.

Persistent reports, however, that M. A. Lynch, of Redmond, is to remain on the commission for the present and that the only contemplated change in the highway commission is the replacement of C. E. Gates, Medford, who would logically be succeeded by a southern Oregon man, gave rise to capital gossip Friday that Hanley might be the governor's choice for director of the new department of agriculture.

Hanley is a pioneer rancher of the eastern Oregon country, has had a wide experience in dealing with agricultural problems and stands well with all of the farming interests and organizations in the state.

PRESBYTERIANS TO HEAR DR. McLEOD

A mass meeting of Presbyterian men is being held in the Roseburg Presbyterian church Tuesday evening, March 10. The men's Bible class is sponsoring the gathering, and B. S. Nichols and C. W. Delegations are also expected from Sutherlin and Oakland churches. Dr. McLeod will speak on the subject, "What the church brings to our town." There is no charge for the dinner, and any who are interested are invited to communicate with the committee in charge or the pastor, Rev. Alexander Mairden.

INDIAN HOOPSTERS BEAT NORTH BEND

Victory, 23 to 10, Places
R. H. S. 3rd in Standing;
Spencer's Also Wins

The Roseburg senior high school Indians took third place in the district basketball conference by beating North Bend last night, 23 to 10, in a game at the senior high gymnasium. The game was played very deliberately, both teams playing a careful game, featured on both sides by strong defensive work. Both teams used much the same style, playing the ball in the center of the floor and working for breaks through to the basket.

Covert, Roseburg forward, was the saving factor in last night's game, scoring baskets from all angles. Covert took the heart out of North Bend early in the game with one of the most nerve-wracking shots to be seen on the local floor this year. Covert took the ball outside the division line and tried to find a man uncovered closer to the basket. He was unable to pass and so took chances with a long shot. The ball hit the hoop, rolled around the edge, then jumped entirely out of the basket into the air, and fell on the rim to roll around again before finally dropping through the net. Covert made 12 of Roseburg's 23 points, with Entler scoring three baskets and a foul throw for 7 points.

Defense At Par
The Roseburg defense was exceptionally good, holding North Bend to only three field goals in the entire game.

This victory in the last conference game of the season gives Roseburg third place in the league, and a fine position in the pairing for the district tournament to be played at Marshfield next Thursday, Friday and Saturday.
