TODAY'S MARKETS

(Associated Press Licensed Wire)

PORTLAND, March 7.—Portland wholesale butter market opened firm today with receipts lighter and demand better, especially for 88-92 percent.

Egg market remained weak. Receipts were in excess of demand and included many off grade eggs. Retailers buying direct from producers were an unsettling factor.

Both butter and egg quotations were unchanged.

Conditions in the fresh fruit and vegetable trade were reported by the government market news service as follows:

Roseburg's cauliflower harvest is delayed by very cool nights, following the favorable warm weather of last week. Consequently, heaviest shipments will probably not materialize for a week yet. California's cauliflower loadings continue heavy, with an occasional load shipped to the north-

west; meanwhile, some of Roseburg's movement is being sold in the midwest, with that district offering a premium over local markets.

Local spinach is arriving in heavier volume, with quality equal to all outside offerings. As a result, there is higher demand for Walla Walla and California spinach, and an active movement of local stock at prices as high as \$1.00 per 20-lb box.
