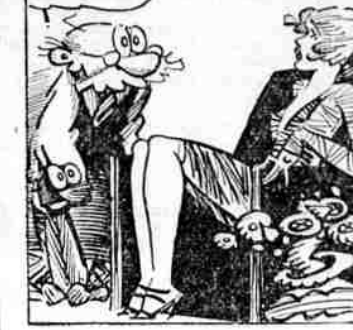

DUNCAN TO APPEAL TO HIGHEST COURT

PORTLAND, March 10 — Attorneys for Robert Gordon Duncan, Portland golf course owner, radio speaker, and candidate for congressman last May, said today an appeal will be taken to the United States supreme court in an attempt to reverse the decision of the circuit court of appeals which yesterday confirmed his conviction for using profane language over a radio station.

Duncan, "The Oregon Wildcat," and "Chain Store Nemesis," was convicted in federal district court in Medford last October.

George Neuner, United States attorney, who argued the case before both courts, said he has no doubt the United States supreme court will affirm the lower courts. Duncan was arrested after a three-months campaign in which he spoke each night over KVEP here in the interests of his fight for the republican nomination to congress and his anti-chain store program. The conviction was based on the charge he used profane, obscene and indecent language. The license of the station was revoked.
