

GRANGE OFFICIALS USE NO RITUALS

Douglas Installations Are
Conducted From Memory
for First Time.

For the first time in the history of the grange movement in Douglas county, the officers of all the subordinate and Pomona granges have been installed in an impressive manner with no rituals in evidence. The credit for this must go to Mrs. W. Alice Goff, who was ably assisted by Mrs. Ethel Husebark, both of whom are members of the Melrose grange.

Dividing the county into sections these two ladies, generally assisted by members of the local granges, installed the officers of South Deer creek, Evergreen and Glendale granges January 1 at the former's hall.

January 14 they installed the officers of Myrtle Creek and Ridge granges at Myrtle Creek, and January 16 installed the officers of Tenmile and Rescue granges into office at Tenmile's hall. Melrose, Coles Valley and Riverdale grange officers were installed at Melrose, January 3, and January 24 these two ladies, assisted by the members of Drain grange, installed the officers of the latter organization. The Pomona officers were installed at South Deer creek grange hall January 1. The program of installations was completed at Melrose, Coles Valley and Riverdale of the newly reorganized grange at Oakland were officially seated.

Mrs. W. Alice Goff, who is manager of the Douglas County Pomona grange, was born in Klamath county, daughter of Henry and Florence Conn, pioneer family of Oregon. She organized the first degree team in Douglas county, at Melrose grange, and served two terms as master of that thriving organization, during which period all officers of the grange memorized the degree work. Mrs. Goff is deputy for juvenile granges in southern Oregon. She organized the first juvenile grange in Douglas county, February 25, at Glendale, with a large charter list.

Through the efforts of Mrs. Goff and Mrs. Husebark, the grange movement in Douglas county has received a wonderful impetus.

PASSENGER FARES SLASHED BY S. P.

Railway Striving to Regain
Local Business Lost to
Highway Rivals.

Marking one of the most striking general reductions in passenger fares effected by any railroad serving the Pacific northwest since the war, Southern Pacific today

announced cuts ranging from 15 to 20 per cent on its one-way and roundtrip fares between Portland, Willamette valley points and southern Oregon. The new rates will become effective March 15.

New rates will apply from all stations Portland to Eugene, inclusive, to southern Oregon points via the Skikyou line and from Ashland to Eugene and all points north. Tickets will be on sale daily. Reductions will apply on both one-way and roundtrip tickets. One way tickets will have a limit of 10 days; roundtrips, 60 days. Stopovers will be permitted within the limits.

"Southern Pacific is determined to regain the local passenger business it has lost to the highways during the past few years," J. A. Ormandy, passenger traffic manager, said in making the announcement. "The pronounced success which has attended our 'Dollar Day' and other special sales events leads us to believe people generally prefer to travel by train, and these new fares are intended to stimulate that trend. We are putting in these reduced rates for a six months' experiment."

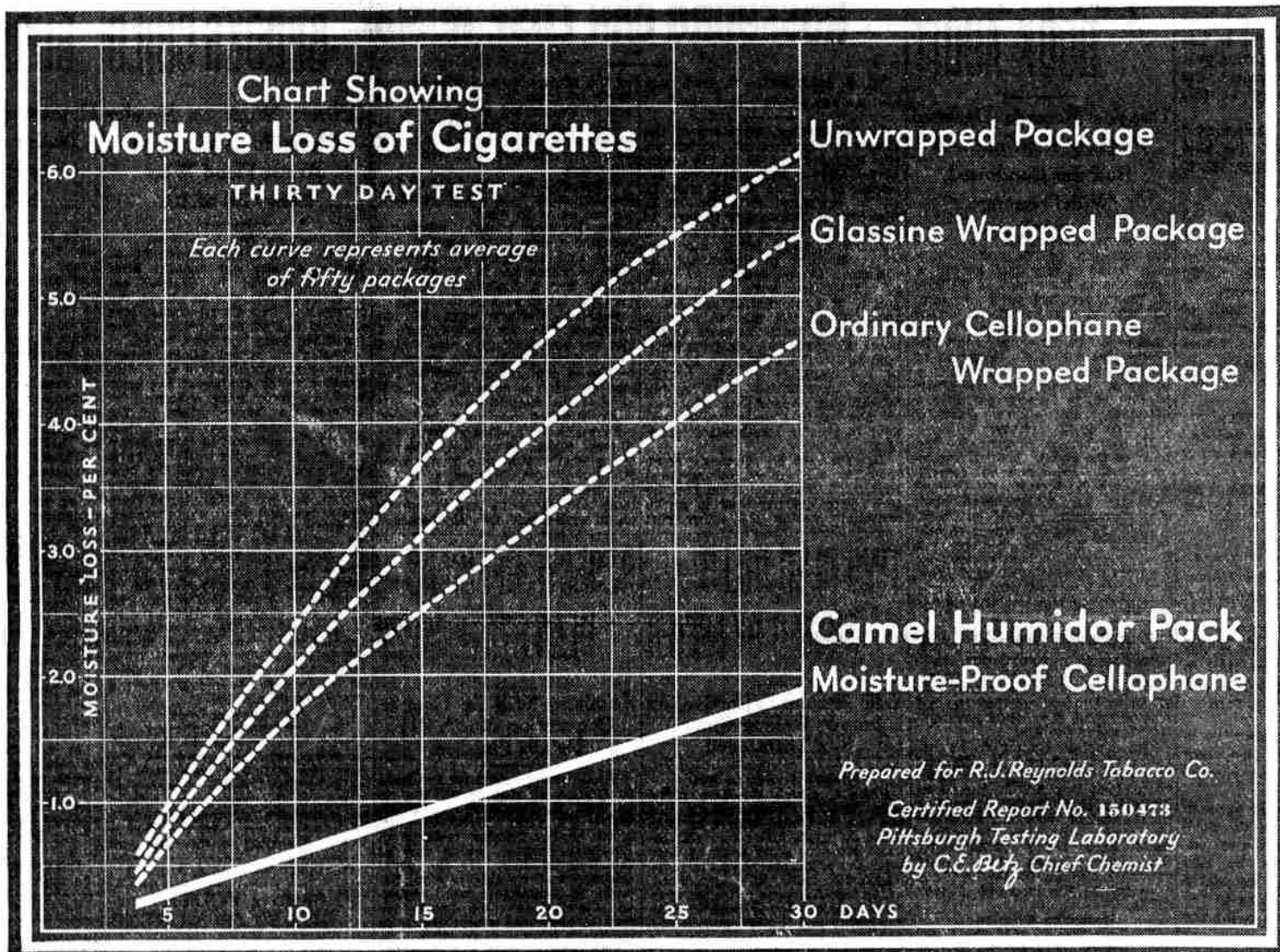
Ormandy said these reductions are in line with the downward trend of all commodity prices and are being put into effect despite the fact that the cost of rail transportation is one cost which has not been materially decreased during the past several years.
