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The Dairying Industry

R. W. MORSE, dairy specialist with the extension service of the Oregon State Agricultural college, gave the Kiwanis club this week some interesting data on the Oregon dairying industry.

There is no real danger of over-production in Oregon at this time, Mr. Morse said. The increase in population during the last decade was 9.4 percent while during the same period the number of cows increased but 5.1 percent.

The three factors necessary to success in the dairy business are: 1. Good sensible careful management.

2. High test cows of proven ability. 3. Cheap home-grown feed.

The first factor is purely a personal one. Good management is just as easy of accomplishment as bad management, but study and hard work and hard thinking are necessary.

It is easy to say that it is necessary to have high test cows of proven ability. How can the production of a cow be accurately determined, you might ask, Mr. Morse has an answer. There is now in the process of formation here an organization known as a dairy herd improvement association, commonly called a cow testing association. Members of such an organization employ a full time expert who makes tests of each cow in each herd at regular intervals.

As to the third factor in dairying success, home-grown feed at low cost, we should be able to compete with the world in this valley on that point. Alfalfa, the best dairy feed crop, is grown here with almost amazing success.

Speaking strongly in behalf of the idea of forming a cow testing association, Mr. Morse pointed out that the Tillamook district did not become famous as a dairying section until cow testing and record keeping was inaugurated there.

How many of the world's cows in Douglas county are merely food for profit earners? This writer believes that in the answer to that question lies the key to better dairy production. The proven way of answering that question is by methodical testing, such as carried on in a cow testing organization.

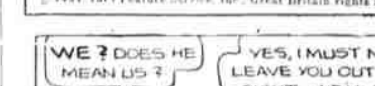

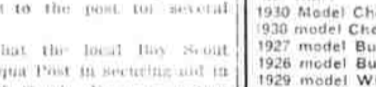

CHAPTER 31—CONTINUED

Comrade Joe Wall was announced as the champion membership getter with 68 points to his credit. Comrade Iroy Young, with a credit of 59 points, was second, and Comrade Frank Hills, with a credit of 37, was third. Suitable prizes were presented to these diligent workers by Comrade State Commander Murphy on behalf of Umpqua Post.

Comrade Ritzman complimented the members of the membership team on the excellent showing made.

Comrade Devaney who served as service officer during 1926 stated that he had a total of \$244.80 from the county Soldiers' and Sailors' Indigent Fund in aiding distressed local veterans. He stated that he would submit a complete report for the year to the new service officer.

Comrade McAllister told of the activities at the district conference at Marshfield. Comrades Ritzman, McAllister and John Flurry attended as delegates from Umpqua Post.

Comrade McAllister also reported on the smoker, stating that it had been very successful in every manner. The total receipts were \$274.25 and the expenses \$256.91, leaving a profit of \$17.34. This result was considered excellent in view of the fact that it had been estimated the smoker would cost the post not less than \$50.

Comrade McAllister also reported the result of the show, "The Unknown Soldier," stating that a profit of \$64.16 had been realized. Upon motion made, seconded, and carried it was ordered that the adjutant write a letter of thanks to Manager Gross, of the Liberty Theater for his generosity.

Comrade Stewart stated that he had taken up with the local posts of the G. A. R. and Spanish-American War Veterans the matter of handling the county soldiers' and sailors' indigent fund this year, but that he would not be able to make a report to the post for several weeks.

Comrade Commander Ritzman stated that the local Boy Scout executive had asked the cooperation of Umpqua Post in securing and improving the Scout camp grounds at Wolf Creek. Upon a motion made, seconded and carried it was ordered that a committee from Umpqua Post be appointed to act with Comrade Ritzman on this matter. The standing Boy Scout committee was appointed to serve as this committee.

Comrades Ritzman and Melton reported in regard to the sickness and injuries of Comrades Caskey, Gilbreath and Byron.

Comrade Stewart stated that the Chamber of Commerce wished each of the local service organizations to have charge of a program at the forum luncheon. Upon motion made, seconded and carried it was ordered that such a committee be appointed from Umpqua Post. Comrades H. C. Church, Ben Larson and H. M. Mateland were appointed to act on this committee.

The various state officials and Mr. Cheney each made short talks regarding Legion work, and Comrade Cooper told of the workings of the Veterans' Bureau.

Comrade State Commander Murphy, on behalf of Umpqua Post presented a past commander's job to each of the following past year members: Carl E. Wimberly, Leo G. Devaney, John E. Flurry, E. H. Stewart, Oscar Berte and Leon P. McWhitack. A fitting address accompanied each presentation, to say nothing of an embrace and snack on each check in true French style.

The pot was passed and contained \$626.00 in gold, which went into the accumulating fund. The name of George Parker was drawn but as he was not present the fund was allowed to accumulate. Motion adjourned.

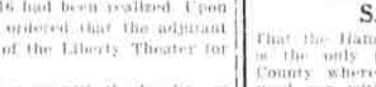
MALE PRISONER HAS LADY "FIXINS"
